We have had a very disagreeable winter in this part of the country in consequence of the many heavy winds, which have piled up the snow in many places at a fearful rate. With this exception we have had a very favorable winter, and we anticipate an early Spring. It is the calculation to sow all the grain that our forces will admit of.

Our County Commissioners have taken into consideration the necessity of building a permanent bridge over Bear River, on the road from here to Paris. They have constructed a pile-driver and have let the contract to Messrs. Foy and Jost to build a pile bridge, which they are busily engaged in building.

We have a very good school, with 70 scholars enrolled, taught by Bro. B. H. Allred and wife, also a good Sunday school, with 100 scholars, under the supervision of Bro. John Burneg, assisted by other brethren of the place, who have taken an active interest in the welfare of the Sunday school.

We have adopted the advice of President Young in opening our dances at 2 p. m. and closing at 10 p. m., which I believe gives general satisfaction. 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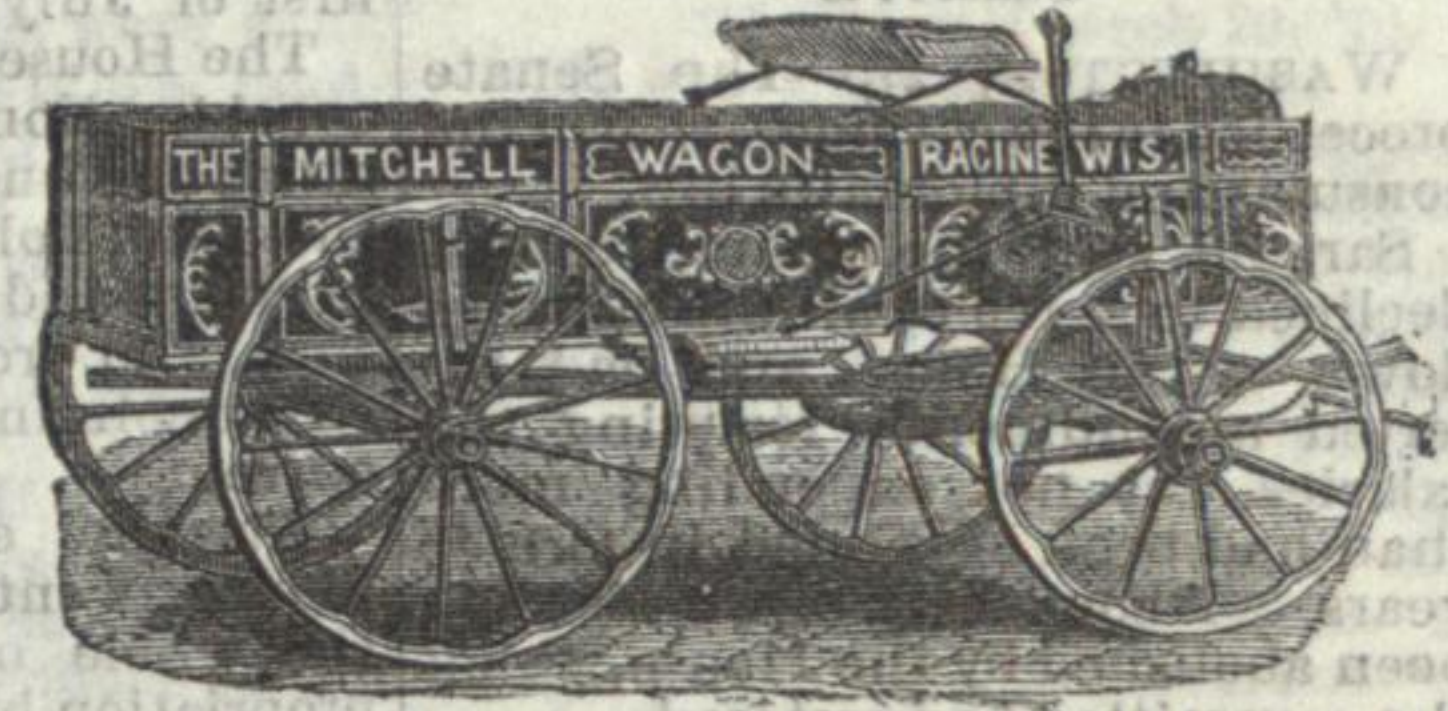
