Late Discoveries in This Arizona Field Are Important.

Jerome, Ariz., Aug. 29.-New evidence comes forward with increasing frecomes forward with increasing fre-quency of the widespread extent of the Verde copper beds. The expectation of geologists is thus finding significant con-firmation, as they have all along insist-ed that from the invariable tendency of sulphide ore bodies to assume a hori-zontal rather than a vertical position, it would be highly unreasonable to sup-pose that the United Verde mine had obtained even a vertifial monopoly of the biained even a partial monopoly of the mineral resources of the Jerome dis-trict.
