LABOR DAY CELEBRATION.  
Federation Preparing for Big Observance of the Day Here.

At a meeting yesterday morning at the Federation of Labor hall, a resolution was adopted for the purpose of getting outside representation for the big parade on Labor day, and it is expected that fully 7,000 men will be in line, 2,000 coming from the various mining camps. A committee was appointed to visit the towns and secure aid of the unions there. The committee is composed of John N. Spaulding and E. A. Harvey. They will go to Bureka, Bingham, Park City, Tintic and many other points.

A feature of the parade will be floats and a large number will be erected for the occasion. Plans are now being made for them. ## SOLOON CASES UP AS SPECIAL ORDER

Council Will Take Up Its Investigation At Tonight's Session—To Name Inspector.

As a special order of business tonight, the city council will investigate the charges against three saloon keepers of selling liquor to minors and on Sundays. If the charges are proven their licenses will be revoked under the ordinance. Demerits & Veros of 597 West Second South street are charged with selling liquor on Sundays to their countrymen, Heath Bros. are accused of selling liquor to minors by the juvenile court officers and H. Meyer of 50 North Third West street is charged with selling liquor after hours, and keeping a disorderly house. The saloon men will be given a hearing and a chance to refute the charges. The council will also consider the application of Doul Bros. proprietors of the Owl drug store, for a liquor license which was rejected by the license committee because the firm sells highballs over the soda water fountain. Mayor Bransford will probably make the appointment of the chief inspector under the slaughter house ordinance tonight. The ordinance goes into effect on Aug. 1 and most of the slaughterhouses will be ready to comply with it by that time. City Food Inspector Walter J. Frazier will also send in the name of his deputy for confirmation tonight. Besides this there is nothing on the council's agenda for tonight in the committee's reports.

DIES OF HEART FAILURE.  
W. S. Newberry, Former Newspaperman, Attacked on the Street.

W. S. Newberry, formerly manager of the Western Newspaper Union of this city, dropped dead of heart disease yesterday afternoon near the D. & R. G. yards on Fourth South between Fifth and Sixth West.

The stricken man had gone out for a walk when he was attacked. Several persons ran to his side and Dr. C. M. Benedict was summoned, but the doctor announced that death was due to heart failure.

Mr. Newberry came to Salt Lake about 10 years ago from Lincoln, Neb., for the benefit of his health. He was then suffering from tuberculosis and a weak heart. In spite of the changes of location, he grew worse and a short time ago he was compelled to give up work altogether. He had been engaged in newspaper work most of his life, and was at one time editor of the Albany Times. He was a member of the press committee of the Elks' lodge, and was 42 years old. He leaves a widow and two children, Walter and Ruth, 14 and 7 respectively. The body is at the S. D. Evans mortuary chapel. Arrangements for the burial will be announced later.

GOING AFTER CONVENTION.  
Governor Sperry, Mayor Bransford and Others Lead Aid to Printers.

The annual report of the printers' union which is prepared at the headquarters of the International Typographical union and mailed to each of the delegates who go to the convention, has been issued, and is now in the hands of the delegates from Utah, who will go to the national convention at St. Joe, Mo., next month. The report deals with old age pensions, insurance features, health organization, burial benefits, as well as the financial side of the organization. At the close of the year, which was May 31, 1909, there was a balance of \$358,725.47 in the treasury.

The delegates from Utah to the 1909 convention, of whom H. W. Dennett is chairman, are determined to bring the 1910 convention here if possible, and in this move they have behind them Governor Sperry, Mayor Bransford, as well as several influential organizations.

## WHEELER IN CHURCH PULPIT.

Attorney for Anti-Saloon League Urges Support for Its Work.

Wayne B. Wheeler, attorney for the Anti-Saloon League of America, was the speaker yesterday morning at the First Congregational church. He took as his text the fifth verse of the twenty-first chapter of the First Book of Samuel. "And the priest said, 'Behold, thou sleepest in the valley of Elah, behold it is here wrapped in a cloth, take it, for there is none other save that here.' And David said, 'There is none other like that, give it me.' Mr. Wheeler compared the Anti-Saloon league with the sword of David, slaying the Goliath of the liquor traffic in the hands of God's church, with which the saloon curse in America is to be vanquished.

He asserted that the best solution of the saloon question is the Anti-Saloon league, and he characterized the liquor traffic as one that took away the manhood, usefulness and pride of all men, young and old.

He stated that the anti-saloon movement was thoroughly practical, as its end was to result in the taking up of the question of revenue for the state and exposed the weakness of the arguments of the saloon men, and then told of the great victories which are being made all over the country by the advocates of prohibition.

In conclusion he appealed to his audience to help in the great fight and to leave the work for others. Sentimental expressions were received at the close of his address for the benefit of the anti-saloon movement.
