The Budget.

LONDON, March 26.—Goschen, Chan-
cellor of the Exchequer, introduced a
budget in the Commons tonight. He
spoke for four hours explaining the
details and proposals. In summing up
he said the excess of revenue, over the
estimates, added to a saving in ex-
penditures, gave a total of realized sur-
plus of £2,155,000, the greatest since
1874. He had begun the year with a
surplus on hand of £2,970,000, and
ended with a balance of £7,438,000,
leaving the National debt yet to be
increased by the balance of £4,468,000.

He estimated for the coming
year, would give a surplus of £2,371,000
over the expenditures. They
desired to raise money to make
good the deficiency by various minor
taxes. The government proposed to
meet expenditures for the fortifica-
tion of ports and coaling stations by
raising a yearly loan of £2,300,000 on
the credit of national bonds. The
Canal scheme, thus avoiding placing
the slightest burden on the taxpayers
asked the House to pass the resolu-
tion at once reducing the income tax
and increasing the duty on spirits.

The Indian budget estimates for
1887-88 show a deficit of £2,448,000,
without counting £200,000 spent for
special defenses. The deficit is caused
mainly by the conversion of the stock
of the Indian railways, and the
military expenses in Burma, etc.

SENATE.

WASHINGTON, March 26.—Callom,
from the committee on Territories,
reported unanimously, resolutions de-
claring it to be the sense of the Senate
that new states should be admitted
into the Union only on the basis of
equality with existing states and that
Congress ought not to exercise any
supervision over the provisions of the
constitution of any such new
states, further than is necessary to

FISH AND GAME LAW.

The following are the amendments
to the fish and game law, made at the
last session of the Legislature, to go
into effect May 1, 1888.

An act supplemental and amendatory to
chapter 6, session laws of 1884, en-
titled "an act for the protection of fish
and game."

SECTION 1. Be it enacted by the Gov-
ernor and Legislative Assembly of the
Territory of Utah, That any person
who, between the 15th day of March
and the 15th day of September in each
year, wilfully takes, kills, destroys or
offers for sale, any kind of wild geese
or ducks, or who shall at any time rob
the nests of the above mentioned birds
or who shall kill any wild geese or
ducks between one hour after sun-
set and one hour before sunrise, shall
be guilty of a violation of the provisions
of this section.

SEC. 2. Every person who, between
the 15th day of November of each year
and the 15th day of August following,
takes, kills or destroys any deer, or
who shall at any time kill any of the
above animals for their skins, is guilty
of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction
thereof shall be fined in any sum not
less than one hundred dollars, or may be
punished by both fine and imprison-
ment.

SEC. 3. Any person who puts into
the waters of this Territory any poi-
sonous substance, or any explosive or
other explosives, upon conviction
thereof shall be fined in any sum not
less than one hundred dollars, or may be
punished by both fine and imprison-
ment.

SEC. 4. It shall be a misdemeanor to
take out of this Territory any game
taken or killed within its boundaries.

SEC. 5. The county court of each
county shall appoint a fish and game
commissioner, whose term of
office shall be two years, and
until his successor is appointed,
and qualified to perform the duties
of his office, take and subscribe to
the oath of office, and give a bond in
the penal sum of \$1000 for the faithful
performance of his duties, said bond to
be approved by the probate judge, and
the commissioner shall receive such com-
pensation as shall be determined by the
county court, to be paid out of the
county treasury, and shall perform his
duties under the direction of the county
court. It shall be the duty of the
commissioner to see that all laws of
this Territory for the protection of
fish and game are faithfully enforced,
and shall report his doings to the
county court quarterly. All fines and
penalties for violation of the provi-
sions of this act shall be paid into
the county treasury of the county
wherein the offense shall have been
committed.

SEC. 6. That sections 1 and 2 of chap-
ter 6, of the session laws of 1884, be and
are hereby repealed.
