Fertilizer—We are shown to day

some crystals of sulphate of

ammonia, prepared from the ammu-

nical liquor of the Gas Works.

When we take into considera-

tion the value of this sulphate for man-

ual purposes, it seems reasonable

to expect that the day is not far

distant when this salt will be pre-

pared on a large scale and made an

article of commerce.

Although these valleys are fertile they can be

made more so by these methods

now commonly resorted to in other

countries; and there is every incen-

tive to activity in this direction.

We have an increasing population

and with increased demands for

our agricultural products. Much of

the fertility of our soil is due to the

decomposition of the rocks of the

mountain ranges, but the ammoni-

cals are not supplied to a large

extent from this source. Neither

are the phosphates.

Brother Russell and some other

brethren are busy in this direction,

preparing bone manures, which

must necessarily command a ready

sale. And now there seems to be

an opportunity for our gas liquor

and coal tar products to be brought

into use, to still further simplify our

method of preparing the agricultural

resources.

We have reason to congratulate

ourselves on the increased attention

which is being paid by the breth-

ren to native manufacture. Our

resources are immense, practically

inexhaustible, and all but worn

out. Coal, coke, iron, refractory

clays, a good oil, an industrious

and intelligent people, there is

no limit to our progress. Of the

minerals which appear to be a fair prospect of a continued sup-

ply. Be that as it may, with the

heavenly propitious to us as a peo-

ple, the exercise of that skill which

is at our command and the utilisa-

tion of the vast natural resources

so lavishly bestowed upon us by

Providence, we cannot fail of suc-

cess.
