

SITUATIONS STILL UNCHANGED

Interchange of Freight Between Salt Lake Route and Southern Pacific.

E. W. GILLET HERE FROM EAST

General Freight and Passenger Agent Of Clark Road Has No News On Subject.

E. W. Gillett, general freight and passenger agent of the San Pedro, Los Angeles & Salt Lake road, arrived in Salt Lake this morning from New York and Chicago, where he has been for three weeks arranging for the opening of general agencies.

When asked as to what had been done at the meeting in New York Mr. Gillett stated that he knew nothing. In answer to a question regarding the interchange of freight at the California end of the system, the lack of which has constituted considerable talk in railroad circles, Mr. Gillett affirmed that the situation was unchanged.

He further asserted that there was nothing new to come out of interest to the general public and as yet he was not in a position to announce who would be appointed assistant general freight agent of the Salt Lake route to take Mr. Worden's place. Mr. Gillett leaves with Mr. Moore for Los Angeles tonight in order to arrive at headquarters prior to the date of Mr. Worden's resignation.

The fact, however, that the Salt Lake route is establishing independent agencies in the east is taken to mean in local railroad circles, that the Salt Lake route is going it alone, or proposes so to do. It is argued that otherwise the road would be represented in Harriman offices as heretofore.

FOR FISHERMEN.

Rio Grande Will Put on Special Train Every Sunday.

General Agent Benton of the passenger department of the Rio Grande this morning announced that arrangements have been made commencing Sunday evening to put on a special train which will leave the Upper Falls every Sunday evening at 8:40 to connect with the regular flyer at Provo, which arrives in Salt Lake shortly after 11 p. m. This will give the fishermen and fishermen in Provo a long day and will not compel them to leave early in the afternoon when the fishing commences, as has been the case heretofore.

LOS ANGELES & REDONDO.

H. E. HUNTINGTON HAS PURCHASED ALL HOLDINGS AND INTERESTS.

San Francisco, July 12.—A special to the call from Los Angeles says the official announcement has been made that through the consummation of a deal just terminated H. E. Huntington has purchased entire all of the holdings and interests of the Los Angeles & Redondo Railway company. The property comes into the hands of Huntington through the purchase of every share of the capital stock of \$1,000,000 and the assumption of the bonded indebtedness of \$600,000. It is also announced that the purchase is made by Huntington personally and that none of his other electric railroad enterprises enter in the transaction in the matter.

BIG ORDER.

Eighty-five Locomotives for the Santa Fe Road.

The Santa Fe road has ordered 85 locomotives from the Baldwin company at Philadelphia. Fifty of these are to be of the balance compound type, divided between the "Pacific" and "Atlantic" styles of model, such an order means an expenditure of over a million of dollars. The balance compound is where the high pressure cylinders act directly on the forward driving axle immediately under the boiler, the same as in the old fashioned "inside connection" locomotive; the low pressure, or the larger cylinders acting on the outside, under the drivers, as obtains in the ordinary simple acting engine. This combination in the new engine operates much more steadily and economically and nearly obviates the necessity of placing balance weights on the drivers.

PANAMA LINE.

Contract With Pacific Mail Steamship Company Terminates Today.

New York, July 12.—The contract between the Panama Mail Steamship company and the Pacific Mail Steamship company, under which the latter has for years enjoyed the exclusive privilege of handling freight on the Pacific side of the company's route, will terminate today. Hereafter all carriers will be on a parity in respect to transit facilities on the technique.

Mr. Winston in his recent report on the Panama railroad, recommended that if the Pacific Mail Steamship company withdraws its present Panama line an effort will be made to induce some other company to establish a first class service between the important Pacific coast ports of the United States and Panama.

Upon excellent authority it can be stated that the government does not anticipate that the Pacific Mail will carry out its threat to take its vessels from the Panama-San Francisco service nor does it expect the abrogation of a contract to affect in any way the shipment of merchandise from New York to San Francisco.

SHOPS AT SPARKS

Extensive Improvements Are Scheduled By The Southern Pacific There.

The Southern Pacific company is preparing to begin work on some extensive improvements at Sparks, Nev. The present machine and boiler shops are to be duplicated, in order to provide facilities for more extensive repair work. And a new car shop is to be built. The buildings are to be erected on a piece of vacant ground immediately east of the transfer table. The machine and boiler shops will be substantial brick structures, and the car shop will be a large frame building. The large machines for engine and boiler repairing will be placed in the new shops, and the principal part of the company's repair work on the Sacramento division as well as on the line east of Sparks, will be done there, the reason that the modern facilities at Sparks are capable of turning out more and better work than any of the other machine shops of the system. The new buildings will nearly double the capacity of the shops at Sparks, and will materially increase the population of the growing Nevada town.

HOW STATE IS MISREPRESENTED.

Campaign of Villification Carried On by So-Called Christian Missionaries.

EXTRACTS FROM THEIR REPORTS

What Utah Gospel Mission Is Doing to Help Utah and the Neglected "Mormons."

Under the heading, "Pernicious Advertising," a recent issue of Truth has the following:

In my letter to you on February 14th, I told you how the Presbyterians through Brother S. E. Wishard, their superintendent of Utah and Idaho, were advertising Utah in the Presbyterian Assembly Herald. These articles in the Assembly Herald pictured our homes as hovels and our schools as mean and insufficient. There is now being circulated through the eastern states a little book which seems to supplement the Assembly Herald. This book tells the world and leads it to believe that all the people (except the orthodox missionaries) in Utah are ignorant, debased and immoral. The title of the book or pamphlet is "The Story of Our Work and What Afloat in Mormondom During 1904. Being the Annual Report of the Utah Gospel Mission." The book is dishonest in the extreme and, like the Assembly Herald, tells only half of a story, which is the meanest kind of a lie. It gives a history of eleven orthodox missionaries who traveled through Utah during the summer of 1904. These missionaries, visiting 5,000 families, held 172 meetings in 45 different places. On page 10 of their pamphlet they speak of Mormon ideas as paganism and on page 14, like Brother Wishard, they speak of the "High People as a people who sit in darkness." To read the entire book, you would be led to believe that they did not meet a Gentile in all their travels and all the Mormons they met were bad ones. They do not have one good word for Utah and her people.

In summing up their entire work, they say: "In the extracts from letters on page 14 and beyond will be found facts of intense interest to those who are interested in the state of Utah and other points." I will give a few of the extracts in their entirety. "A boy at a certain place said that some one was drunk and had a 'scrap' (fight) at nearly every dance they have there. They are very dandified in the building where the other church meetings are also held, and are under the auspices of the Young Men's Mutual."—(Y. M. M. L. A.) "Former Bishop... maltreated his four wives, left them and eloped with one of them. His first wife, who was put out of the church, but now has managed to get back in. This is the story, in brief, told me by one of the 'poly' wives. She will call her husband by the name, but not the name of her former husband."

"In conversation with a Mormon, he said: 'If you pay your tithing, you are all right.' As to morals, he said, no account was taken of drunkenness, dishonesty, fighting in the streets, etc." "A Mormon: 'I never committed any sins.' What did Christ die for then?" "His own sins, of course." "In—A lady said she never read the Bible, but she would like to read it to tell her everything." "A Mormon lady teacher, talking to a young Mormon girl who is seriously thinking of becoming a Christian: 'If you become a Christian the boys will not come to see you.' She replied, 'Is that so? Don't the boys come to see Christian girls?'"

"A certain mine operator said: 'You can't trust the Mormons, they are such thieves and drink in the time of the year.' This is too strong for a universal statement, but is too sadly true of very many."

"Plural wife No. 2: 'Polygamy is hell. I know; I was No. 3. My children did not know their father; he never took any notice of them, and did not provide for me or them.'"

"Bitterate Mormon: 'Well, I see God at the dedication of the Temple (Salt Lake). He came out in his robes and held out his arms so (reading). And it was just as they said it would be, before the dedication. Some seen him and some didn't. But I seen him.'"

"A Mormon elder said last night in his talk: 'God has a wife—this is the way he creates; using as proof when I asked him at the close of the meeting for a Bible text, Gen. 1 and 2.'"

It missionaries for one season. This is what they advertise to the whole world as samples of the people they found in Utah. What an awful lie! What an awful impression these emissaries of God are trying to create in the minds of the people of the eastern states about Utah! In their entire book from cover to cover they say nothing about the thousands of good people they saw, but they magnified and exaggerated all the bad they found. This is the usual method employed by most of the orthodox missionaries in Utah. It was the method Dr. Paden used in the Smoot protest as well as the one by his baser friend and retainer, J. L. Leitch. Brother Wishard rolls it as a sweet morsel under his tongue when he makes a speech or preaches a sermon on Utah and it is the most prominent thing in his letters to his sisters and his ministers. Any missionary who will go to a Mormon home or to the home of any person with a Bible in one hand and religious tracts in the other, representing himself to be a messenger of the Most High and Lowly Jesus when he gets their confidences, writes down their ungrammatical and crude sayings and publishes them to the world in ridicule, as it were, is a traitor and a hypocrite. The above may be strong language, but the Gentiles of Utah are getting tired of the itinerant soul-savers who go about this state digging up the literary excrement of the ignorant Mormons and publishing it to the world as a sample of our state, and its people. Federal Services Over Remains of Little Orson P. S. Musser.

The funeral services over the remains of Orson P. S. Musser will be held at 2 p. m. on Sunday, the 16th inst., in the First ward meetinghouse, situated on Eighth East street between Seventh and Eighth South streets. Last Saturday the 11th inst. Matilda Johnson Gets Judgment Against Insurance Company.

(Special to the "News.") Ogden, July 12.—In the district court this morning judgment for \$2,000 was rendered for Matilda Johnson who sued an insurance company for that amount on a policy on her husband's life. Johnson died about a year ago and the company declined to make settlement on the ground that he had not paid his dues.

FREE LIBRARY GROWING

Report for June Shows Gain in Books And Membership.

The report of Miss Sprague, librarian of the free public library, for the month of June was submitted to the library board yesterday at its regular meeting. It shows the number of volumes in the library on July 1 to be 25,547, a gain for the month of 68. The membership on the same date was 15,417, an increase of 131 during the month. There were 5,369 books loaned for home use, or an average of 322 daily. The number of books issued in the reading rooms during the month was 15,417, an average of 116 daily. The daily number of visitors is estimated at 535. The sum of \$62.19 was received in fines and forfeitures. The classified circulation of the library is as follows: Philosophy, 40; religion, 71; sociology, 63; natural science, 54; useful arts, 69; fine arts, 58; literature, 223; history, 97; geography and travel, 63; biography, 196; fiction, 5,152; juvenile, 2,291; German, 61; French, 9; Total, 8,269.

TRAGIC AFFAIR AT POCATELLO.

Discharged Chief Shoots One Man Through the Heart and Wounds Another.

OCCURRED IN A DINING CAR.

Victim is J. W. Hall, Who Died Instantly—Wounded Man Brought To Salt Lake.

Lying at St. Mark's hospital with a bullet wound in the fleshy part of the left leg, above the knee, Arthur Parker, a colored waiter in the dining car service of the Oregon Short Line, is slowly recovering from a murderous attack made upon him at Pocatello yesterday afternoon. The shooting was done by James Thompson, a recently discharged chief, who for some cause or other, opened fire on him and J. W. Hall, as they entered the car in which Thompson had seated himself shortly after the arrival of the passenger train No. 2. Hall was shot through the heart and died instantly, while Parker was wounded as indicated above.

Shortly after the shooting, officers McCarvey and Edgley of Pocatello were notified and located Thompson in a house on Third avenue. At first the man refused to surrender, and declared that he would kill the first man who entered the building. Nothing daunted, the officers broke in the door and found the man with the same gun with which he had done the shooting. The gun had been fully loaded and it was quite evident that the murderer intended to defend himself. He was overpowered without difficulty and is now in custody, awaiting a hearing on the charge of murder.

Parker was brought to Salt Lake for treatment, arriving here at 8:30 last night, and the wound is not at all dangerous, and he will likely recover in a comparatively short time.

Denver Couple Wanted it Kept Secret Till Next Week.

Yesterday there were three names entered upon the register of the Wilson hotel, Louis P. Bondy, P. P. Platt, and Ann H. Allen, all signing from Denver, Colo. Today the personnel of the party is unchanged, but the register records no trace of Ann H. Allen, and Bondy's signature has been changed to read "Mr. and Mrs. Louis P. Bondy, Denver." The other name remains the same.

Just what elements, whether of runaway, or romance, or first-night love, or an appointment of a traveling man with his lady love, to meet in Salt Lake, where his route gives him time to work in a wedding ceremony, enter into the making of the match is not known. Miss Allen and Mr. Bondy were available for interviews yesterday, but Mr. and Mrs. Bondy have no use for the reporter call today. They were married this morning right in the office of the county clerk, where the license to wed was secured. The groom was attended by the other man on the register—P. P. Platt, and he made special requests of Deputy County Clerk David A. Smith that the reporters be tipped off on the affair next week or next month some time. Just now they didn't want anything said. Mr. Smith was accommodating enough. He gave them their license and then the ceremony, sending them happy and delighted out of the office. Councilman A. J. Davis acted as god angel to the trio and escorted them to the clerk's office. When asked as to his version of the affair, he said it was no runaway. Platt was a friend of his, whom he knew to be a traveling man,

and he met him on his way to the county building, introduced him to his friends and said they had come to be married. Davis then showed them the clerk, and did not ask any questions, as he did not wish to pry into the affairs of his friend.

Among the physicians and surgeons who are on the staff are Drs. Frank H. Steele, M. G. Varian, C. F. Pinkerton, J. S. Sharp, E. A. Kiehl of Blighman Junction, and others.
