Probate Court.—Yesterday the  
probate court was occupied in the

**Fatal Accident.**—J. Gee writes  
as follows:  
"Yesterday, Jan. 29, a young man  
John Donaldson, of Tooele City,  
when coming from Dry Canyon, in  
Rush Valley, with a team, loaded  
with ore from the Hidden Treasure  
mine, accidentally fell from his  
wagon, a wheel of which passed  
over his head, crushing it almost to  
atoms, and killing him instantly.  
"An inquest by Coroner John  
Gillmore, of Tooele City, was held  
on the deceased, and a verdict of  
accidental death was rendered.  
"Deceased was a promising young  
man, devoted to his parents, and  
liked by all who knew him, and all  
felt to condole with the bereaved.  
He was about seventeen years of  
age."  
Foolish Conduct.—Night before

and hooting along South Temple  
Street. They played a number of  
senseless pranks on their way. They  
arrested a number of gates from their  
hinges, among them that in front

killer" should happen to come  
across those fellows, one would sup-  
pose they would stand a poor show.

stand that all who choose to attend

lecturer has treated the subject

it. We doubt if that subject has  
ever received the amount of justice  
that Prof. Meiser gives it. His  
comparisons are happy and his re-  
asoning lucid and convincing. It is  
really a lecture that is worth listen-  
ing to.

**Attempted Burglary.**—An at-  
tempt was made by some party to  
gain a burglarious entrance to the  
house of Bishop F. Keeler, 16th  
Ward, at a late hour last night.  
The Bishop had retired to rest, but  
was wide awake, when he heard  
somebody on the outside cautiously  
turning the handle of the door.  
Whoever the party was he made no  
noise in approaching the house, as  
the Bishop heard nothing till the  
Bishop Keeler got out of bed, seized  
his revolver and made for the door,  
with the intention of capturing the  
thief. In the darkness, however,  
he knocked a chain over, making  
some noise, and the burglar, fearing  
the door would be opened, fled.  
The door was not opened, as the  
Bishop sent a shot after the fellow,  
causing the latter, if possible, to in-  
crease his speed. He went off in the direction  
of the railroad depot.
