Umpires deserve all the praise the press and fans can give them, for a man who can see the plays and see them right is rare indeed. Don't roast the umps when you cannot agree with him. He has troubles of his own. The won-der is that the officials do not miss more plays. Think it over, now that you have a little dope on the duties of the job.
