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## D. S. GETS MORE ROOM

Arrangements Made With the Presiding Bishopric for the Use of Part of Tithing Office.

The Latter-day Saints' university has been given more room. Arrangements were made recently with the presiding bishopric for the use of the upper floor of the tithing office, in the rear of the university buildings. It was foreseen early in the year that the available room would be too small for the accommodation of the school, notwithstanding the institution occupied the business college building, the Berrett hall, the Memorial building, the gymnasium, the Lion House, and the basement of the Social Hall. Steadily from September, last, the enrollment has grown, till now it exceeds the 1,250

mark. It was feared, too, that the probable large addition to the enrollment from the mid-winter graduates of the city schools would increase the attendance beyond the capacity of these six buildings. Hence the permission to make use of the tithing office block.
