## IS HE INSANE?

Three Physicians are to Decide the Question.

**W. F. ABRITTON,** the youthful forger, had an examination before Justice Judge Blair yesterday afternoon with regard to the question of his sanity, and it was not until 6 o'clock that the testimony closed. Among the witnesses was Mrs. Abritton, the boy's mother, who mentioned certain of his peculiarities. When very young he fell from a horse, his head striking the ground violently. He was delirious for several days afterwards, and about eighteen months ago witness reached the opinion that his son's mind was affected. Dr. Niles said he considered that young Abritton is a neurotic on the subject of sporting checks and counters. The youth himself acted strangely on and off the witness stand. He seemed to be quite interested by the statements made regarding his occasional eccentricities and now and again indulged in hearty laugh. Questioned by the court as to what he did with the money he had won he said "I used the money mainly in gambling, but had not overlooked 'charitable efforts' altogether. Whenever anyone wanted money only had to let me know and I would give him what I had in my possession as between the pedestrian and the system, Abritton answered that he had thought very much about it."

**D. McLEOD AND WATKINSON,** the attorneys for the defense, made an agreement respecting Abritton and Dr. Niles to the consulting committee.

## A CASE OF INFANTICIDE.

**Another Body of a Little Innocent Found and Turned Over to Coroner Taylor.**

**All Blows under-taking established on Third Street is the daily mangled and lacerated body of a prematurely born infant of probably between six and seven months growth.**

The body was found yesterday morning in the manger of a cow stall in Oliver Street, situated between West Street, between Third and Fourth Streets. It was evident to him that some person had hidden it there during the night before, but who the guilty individual was he has not yet been able to discover. He removes the body to a spot near by and buried it. Today Coroner Taylor learned of the discovery and went out to the manger and found the remains of the recent blow still within the manger.

From this evidence in the county attorney's office there will be sufficient grounds for forwarding to the State's Attorney.

**Welshmen Doing It Honor at Spanish Fork Terry.**

## A REMINISCENCE OF THE LONG AGO

**Why Cambrians Wear the Look Upon the First of March.**

Today every enthusiastic Welshman who could make it ventured forth to Spanish Fork, where some and daughters of Gwynn were having a day of festivity in honor of St. David, the patron saint of Wales. Songs, recitations, speeches and general merrymaking constitute the program, the regular exercises of which began at 2 o'clock this afternoon.

St. Davids day comes down from antiquity as one of the longest observed holidays commemorated in a portion of the British Isles. The precise date of David's birth is not definitely known, but it was about the end of the fifth or beginning of the sixth century. Tradition says that he was the son of Prince Cedewald, King of Deira, and that he became a monk at Menevia, a religious hermitage, as was the custom in those days, a professional period in celibacy, after which he commenced preaching to his countrymen. He built a chapel at Llantwit Major, and founded a school there, of which was at Menevia, near St. Davids, in the vale of Evesham, archbishop of Canterbury, but transferred his see to Davids in 601. He was educated at Cenarth, the school of the philosopher, husband, who taught him his life course at Cedar Port.
