

TO PROVE ALIBIS TO ESCAPE PRISON

S. A. King, Attorney for Alleged Holdups. Says Both Will Go Free.

"TWO ORPHANS" TO SAVE THEM

Both Attended Performance and Were Noticed Because of Disturbance They Made in Audience.

W. S. Jacobson and J. B. Fisk will be able to prove alibis on three holdups of which they are accused, according to Attorney Samuel A. King. Jacobson was released, Monday afternoon, on \$1,500 bond, approved by Judge Bishop, and it is possible that Fisk will be released today.

Fisk and Jacobson were arrested Thursday afternoon, Dec. 9, in a house at Gordon street and Culley avenue, between Eleventh and Twelfth South streets, and between Fifth and Sixth East streets, by Deputy Sheriff Richard Eddington, John Corless and Samuel Nowell, and lodged in the county jail on a charge of having held up the saloon of Charles A. Birch, at Twelfth South and West Temple streets, Tuesday night, Dec. 7, at 8:30 o'clock. They have been partially identified by Birch, J. A. Shaffer, 1950 south West Temple street, and J. H. Schwartz, 2100 south West Temple street, who were in the saloon at the time of the hold-up.

It is also charged that Jacobson and Fisk held up conductor E. E. Miller and Motorman Bert Hendrickson in a street car at the end of the Wadsworth street car line half an hour after holding up Birch's saloon. Fisk is also accused of having held up the Washington saloon, at 131 south Third West street, at 11:50 o'clock on the night of Dec. 1. Nick Butkovich, the proprietor, his brother, Pete, and his son, Pete, all claim to have identified the revolver found on Fisk as the gun which was taken by the robber from the saloon.

SAY THEY CAN PROVE ALIBIS.

Fisk and Jacobson claim that they can prove absolute alibis on all of these charges. Atty. Samuel A. King, who represents Jacobson, stated this morning that neither Fisk nor Jacobson could be held. Last Tuesday night, when they are accused of having held up Birch's saloon and the Wandaners car crew, Fisk and Jacobson were sitting in the Grand theater, watching a performance of "The Two Orphans," it is averred, and O'Donoghue's famous melodrama may save both prisoners from the penitentiary, if they can prove their claim.

Several persons who sat around them will prove their alibis, he says. During the progress of the play, they attracted attention by making various remarks in rather loud tones. One of them said, "The damned old skunk" in referring to the aged hag who was abusing the "orphans" on the stage, and several people protested at the exclamation because it interrupted their interest in the play. The prisoners, say numerous other remarks, of a distinct nature, spoken by Fisk and Jacobson during the course of the show, are also recalled clearly by the persons who sat near them, it is said. Jacobson, it is claimed, worked here with his father in the general contracting business, drawing \$5 per day, although only 19 years old. He left on July 10 of this year and went to Butte, where he has been employed in building work on the county jail. He returned to Salt Lake City, Dec.

that Fisk and Jacobson were "pals" is a mistake. He says: "Jacobson never saw Fisk in his life, before the former came down from Butte, Dec. 1, to visit his parents in their home. It will be proved that Fisk and his wife came here from Jackson's Hole, Wyo., where they had lived for years; that they arrived here with two of their children on Oct. 29; that they left one child in Ogden with their grandparents; that Mr. and Mrs. Jacobson, the elder, had not been working for a well driller; that Fisk and Jacobson were not in the house; that there are no beds on the ground floor of the house, anywhere; that the house Jacobson family residence is not a dirty shack, as is reported, but a nice, 5-room white brick house; that Jacobson is not a 'notorious gun man' wanted in various cities for a number of crimes; that Jacobson is a good, hard-working, honest young fellow, with a clean record; that Fisk, only is not broke, but that he and his wife are owning a respectable home, own \$14,000 worth of property, and a \$1,300 note, and Mrs. Fisk has jewelry worth about \$500; that Fisk, on the morning of the drive, he was arrested, was not in bed, but had really been up many hours, having previously gone out to work for the well-driller, who said that they would not work that day on account of the bad weather; that Fisk had rifles and revolvers for the simple reason that he had been living in a big game country, where everyone hunts and owns arms and ammunition; that Jacobson was not in Salt Lake City at all when the crimes which he is accused of were committed, but was working on the county jail in Butte, Mont., and the payroll there prove it.

"It has been alleged that \$27 was found in Fisk's pockets when he was arrested; that this money was taken from the cash register in Birch's saloon. But we will prove that Fisk had pawned his watch the day before, for \$25, and still has the ticket. He merely wanted the money to tide him over until the well digger paid him his wages."

"The Jacobson home is not a 'rickety old hut,' but a \$2,000 brick house. The boy's mother and father are well known and respected people. He has lived in Salt Lake City since he came here with his parents from Wisconsin, seven years ago, at the age of 12 years," Mr. King says.

Postmaster Thomas Originates Plan To Relieve Onslaught at Main Office in Federal Building.
