INDIANAPOLIS, July 1.—Secretary of State Gresham is in the city. He will speak this morning in an interview. It is said that the President has given an extension of Congress. His credit would do much toward the saving of the financial bankruptcy. All believe Congress would repeat the Chapman act, though he knew what it was to do when he said that it would not have done so two weeks ago.

The President's proclamation was issued with profound gratification in business and business circles every one cheering him. In just bundles of money were sent to the cause of Cleveland's action. In Wall street the last word in a certain extent dictated everybody as that the effect of the proclamation of the stock market was not to be measured with the rest of the country, but when compared with the lowest and deepest point yesterday of the price of the my before, the improvement is at once seen to be very great. The making of the proclamation this morning by President Morgan, head of the house of Drexel, Morgan & Co., said: "I am perfectly satisfied that Cleveland deserved an extra session and think that we have a very good case."

Congressman of Boston, Morgan & Co., said: "I think the proclamation is a very good thing and is a most wise step in his part. He has most decidedly done the right thing. It is a little too early to tell the effect of the proclamation on the market. The market will grow.

The belief will grow that whether it is going to have the same result as the English pound sterling for the transaction of business. We ought soon to reflect better optimism in Europe. All American investment securities."

Other bankers spoke to the same general effect.

NEW YORK STOCKS.

The Effect of President Cleveland's Proclamation.

YORK, July 1.—The President's proclamation calling an extra session of Congress has had a decided effect on the stocks this morning. Everything opened higher. The bears were heavy buyers and in the endeavor to cover his the press up on themselves. Western roads were particularly strong. There was good buying for investment and altogether a most confident feeling prevalent in financial circles.

The market continued to advance after the opening on liberal buying orders for both lead and copper stocks. These, however, pulled down from 42 to 46 cents each. But New Haven, Connecticut, Illinois Central, St. Paul, preferred, &c. The new was assisted by the advance of 33 silver certificates to 72. Subsequently, on sales to realize profits and otherwise, there was a market record of 100%. At 11 the market was steady.

Our money was unusually high, but advanced to Mexican dollars 50.

These were somewhat lower after a slight rally having sold expectation of a heavy selling day. The market closed at 72, having risen to the highest place in the morning of 71 no longer.
