AMERICAN.

WASHINGTON, 5.—Minister White, Berlin, has asked to be relieved, but his successor will not be appointed till he formally resigns.

Secretary Blaine thinks all the government can do is to ask good treatment for Irish-American prisoners in England.

Chandler's friends say if the Senate rejects him he will be United States senator from New Hampshire to succeed Rollins.

Five republican senators oppose, but will not bolt the caucus decree. If many more senators absent themselves, there will be no quorum.

Democrats think the President should send in all the nominations.

Postmaster-General James denies the report that there was a conference about Judge Robertson's nomination in New York, between Vice-President Arthur and Senator Platt, Gov. Cornell and himself. The objects and business of each were so different while they were in New York, that they did not even see one another.

A sagacious New England friend of Wm. E. Chandler said, to-day, that a rejection of his nomination as solicitor-general by a solid democratic vote in the Senate would make his political fortune in New Hampshire, and result in his election to the United States Senate to fill the next vacancy. This may account for the threatened democratic opposition to his confirmation, and says he is content to take his chances.

The *Evening Star*, under the heading of "A Point of Order," publishes the following: Gen. Duncan S. Walker remarked yesterday to a *Star* reporter in the Senate chamber, "All this debate and these proceedings are out of order," asked the reporter. "Because," was the reply, "It's required that all treaties shall be considered in executive session, and this is nothing but a treaty between Mahone and the republicans." Appropos of the many high offices given to Ohio men, it is remarked that except for the brief term of Washburne, of Illinois, as Secretary of State, during the first six days of Grant's administration, Secretary Blaine is the first chief of the State Department who has not been a New Yorker since Buchanan's administration. Secretary Seward, Secretary Fish, and Secretary Evarts were all from that State, and their united terms covered a period of 20 years. Judge Black, of Pennsylvania, was the immediate predecessor of Mr. Seward in the State Department.

The response of the Russian Government to the Senate resolutions on the assassination of the Czar, a copy of which was transmitted by Secretary Blaine to the Senate this afternoon, is in the form of a letter from the Russian minister of foreign affairs to Minister Foster, and has the following paragraph: "My august master has been profoundly touched by this mark of respect for his beloved father, and of sympathy with himself coming from the high assembly of a country for which the deceased Emperor always professed sincere esteem and warm friendship. It is a legacy which he leaves to the Emperor Alexander III., and which his majesty, in accord with the Russian nation, accepts from the bottom of his heart."

The President, in conversation in reference to the New York nominations said he had nothing whatever to reproach himself with. So far as Conkling is concerned he insists that Conkling has really no cause of grievance against the Administration. In Sunday afternoon's interview between the President and Conkling, of which so much has been said, the President was unreserved in his acknowledgment of the obligations which he felt toward the different factions of the republican party in New York, for he realizes very fully that unless they had all pulled together in his behalf he would not now be sitting in the White House, but he took particular pains to impress upon the senator that he could not for one moment think in his public acts of recognizing the divisions of the party, or of giving the patronage of government to any of the factions in such a manner as to be considered as taking sides with either.

Yesterday the President had a long conference with a distinguished republican senator, during the course of which the whole situation in the Senate and elsewhere was

talked over. As the result of the conference, the senator was authorized to communicate to his associates that the President was of the opinion that the subject was one for the Senate itself, and itself alone, to dispose of; that the executive had no responsibility for what had been done, and that he had no opinion whatever to express in the matter.

The commissioner of the General Land Office has rendered a decision in the case of Rancho Arroyo De Rodeo, embracing about 1,500 acres of very valuable land, located in Santa Cruz County, California. Commissioner Williamson decides that as a survey was regularly published under the act of June, 1860, and no objection filed thereto, the publication of the same under the act of 1864 was without authority of law and of no effect; that the land office has no jurisdiction to consider objection made by claimants in pursuance of that publication, and that patent should issue upon Wallace's survey as approved by Surveyor General Maudeville.

Lane, Stockton, paper pulp machine; Henry C. Langrehr, of San Francisco, for fog horn; Frank Mahler, of San Francisco, for flax drawing machine; Isaac N. Matlick, San Francisco, tellureau; Cassus C. Spaulding, Oakland, ice machine; Lowell A. Richards, Grayson, California, threshing machine feeder; Theo. W. Schwall, Sacramento, California, combined ticket case and whistle; Budd Smith, San Francisco, flagstaff holder; Andrew J. Stevens, Sacramento, friction brake for steering apparatus for vessels; Theo. Wagner, San Francisco, shuttle worker.

Dispatches received to-day by Gen. Ordway, of Dakota, give an account of the fearful flood damages in that territory. Lowlands were all submerged, 1,000 head of stock swept away and drowned, railroad ruined and all sorts of property damaged.

OMAHA, 5.—The river is falling slowly at this point. It is thought an ice gorge has formed somewhere between Omaha and Sioux City. Gorges above Sioux City are reported as holding firm yet. The river is falling at Forts Sully and Randall.

Yankton, Dakota, 5.—The only change in the river situation is another rise, which exceeds by far that of the 29th, heretofore reported. Lower Yankton is submerged to-day and the people have been removed to the upper portion of the city. No lives imperiled, but some will occur in removing, and considerable damage must result to property. Intelligence received, to-day, from Bannan, is that out of fourteen persons 10 had been rescued alive and well. A family named Bates and one named Haddemenn, are undoubtedly drowned, and seven other families are probably lost, six miles this side of Green Island. The people have been in part removed to this place. No lives lost here, but the village is completely washed away; water and ice to the depth of 12 feet across the village site. The ice probably choked up the channel of the river a short distance below Yankton, turning a great volume of water across the lowlands on the Dakota side, and flowing eastward 30 miles before it re-enters the channel at Vermillion, a point on the river bank which is reported washed away, with the loss of 30 lives. This report needs confirmation. Former dispatches have given the situation at Niobrara, which intelligence has been confirmed. No lives lost, and damage to the town by submersion, very slight. The river at this point is about six miles in width, its surface covered with broken ice; further east a few miles breadth of water broadens to 15 miles, retaining this width, without exception, for 45 miles.

CHICAGO, 5, 11 p. m.—The returns from 93 precincts give Harrison, democrat, candidate for Mayor, 2,365 majority. The remaining twenty-seven precincts will change this total somewhat, but will not alter the fact that the democrats have carried their entire city and town ticket by a fair majority, with the possible exception of the West Side town tickets. Indications are that the vote of the East Side will be about 60,000, which is nearly 2,000 less than at the Presidential election of last fall.

Midnight.—Harrison's majority will reach 6,000 and probable exceed that figure somewhat. The vote in the city has been very close to 70,000. There was no Socialist ticket

and the votes of that party seem to have gone chiefly to the democrats. The Irish republican vote disappointed the republicans by its smallness, and the German citizens, fearing the beer privileges would be curtailed, cut the republican tickets heavily. The democratic vote remains about the same as in the Presidential election, while the republicans fell away through staying at home and the influences above noticed. There is no doubt that the democrats have made a clean sweep, although by less majorities than that for Mayor. As to aldermen, the republicans, so far as heard from, have made one gain, and the Council will remain republican as at present.

By order of Postmaster-General James, the postmaster at San Francisco will hereafter advise the postmaster at New York City of the dates for each mail steamship departing from San Francisco for Japan and China, and also of the hours and dates of arrival at San Francisco of mail steamers from Japan and China, including, if practicable, the dates of China mails brought by them, and dates and hours of departure from San Francisco of trains by which such mail is forwarded eastward. Those reports will be made public by Postmaster James.

BRIEF TELEGRAMS.

The entire democratic ticket was elected at Columbus.

The cabinet meeting on Tuesday was devoted to the consideration of financial matters.

W. S. Mathews & Sons, manufacturers, Louisville, burned out. Loss from \$15,000 to \$20,000.

Mrs. C. A. Evans, of Omaha, to-day gave birth to four children, one of whom died soon after birth. They were two boys and two girls.

The Farmers' Fertilizing Company, Millin Street wharf, Delaware, with 60 boat houses, a saloon and three or four yachts, burned. Loss, \$150,000.

J. S. McKinney was brought to Omaha to-day, from Montana, by an officer, on a charge of incest in the seduction of his niece, who is in jail, detained as a witness.

In May the Ute commission, divided into three parties, will visit Uncompahgre, Uintah and the Southern Ute agency, to view the lands selected for the Utes.

Charles and Ben Degroat, indicted for arson in burning their hat store in Omaha last December, were arrested in St. Louis on Saturday night, and brought back to-day.

Miss Deull, the Iowa City faster, has wasted away until she is mere skin and bones. At noon to-day she began her 42nd day without food, and she is even stronger than for many days.

Generals Sheridan, Pope, Miller, Leggett and a number of other members of the Army of Tennessee, are in Cincinnati. Ex-President Hayes will be present at the reception to-morrow.

It seems generally conceded that Overstolz, democrat, for mayor of St. Louis, will be badly beaten, and perhaps the whole democratic ticket will be defeated. Many democrats bitterly oppose Overstolz.
