LOCAL BRIEFS.

Utah County Acreage—Anderson & Cummings have sold to Andrew Pendleton, Jr., 500 acres of farm lands in Utah county for \$4,000.

Beaver Public School—Architect Liljenberg has completed plans for a \$40,000 public school at Escalante. It will be of brick, 100 feet by 82 feet, three stories high and contain 40 class rooms.

Copies of the Financier—A large number of copies of the Financier of New York, containing Judge Colburn's article on the Utah county, have been received at the office of the Salt Lake Real Estate association for distribution.

Soldiers to be Discharged—A large part of the Fifteenth U. S. Infantry will be discharged in June, including quite a number from the Gary. As many of the latter as is possible, will be enlisted in the First Infantry band of this city.

Membership Increasing—There are 70 applications for membership in the Commercial club, posted on the bulletin board of the club. There is an campaign on to increase the roster of membership before the club moves into the proposed new building.

U. S. Shop Inspection—The U. S. bureau of animal industry will inspect the sheep shearing corrals of this state in a few days. Before the annual hearing begins, assisted by the state board. Only such sheep as bear federal inspection will be allowed on the forest reserves.

Pays Idaho Loss—The Home Fire Insurance company has paid \$4,000 to the estate of the late J. W. Warren, on his store, which was consumed by fire recently. The loss amounted to \$6,000, but he was not insured for more than the sum specified. The settlement was prompt.

Petitions for Pardon—The following petitions for official clemency have been filed with the attorney general by convicts at the state prison: W. E. Burritt of Salt Lake, robbery, 15 years' sentence, wants commutation; Sam Samuel E. Wade of Ogden, grand larceny, one year, wants pardon.

Improvements at Lagoon—The workmen at Lagoon have the fresh water bathing pool ready for the sand which will be hauled in next week from the north. It is river sand and of a very light color. The general improvements at the resort are being hurried on as fast as possible.

Big Proofreading Job—Forestry Inspector Reynolds is reading the proof of 5 papers of the new laws on forestry convention held in this city. As the papers contain 37,000 words, Mr. Reynolds is not finding time lying idle on his hands. The pamphlet will be ready for publication in 10 days.

MUST RETURN MONEY

City to Reimburse Taxpayers to Amount of \$80,225.93 for Overestimates on Improvements.

Owing to the fact that estimates for various public improvements were not properly figured when submitted and accepted, the city will be under the necessity of reimbursing taxpayers to the amount of \$80,225.93 on assessments made and collected. Again, the municipality is at a loss of nearly \$5,000, or to be exact, \$4,281.15, as the result of underestimates. In the latter instance having to pay for something that would have fallen to the lot of the people had proper figures been given in the first place.

City engineer Kelsey has made to the city council a report, showing the improvements overestimated, and upon which money will have to be returned to taxpayers, as follows:

Paving extension 25, \$1,546.08; 19, \$18,326.77; 15, \$14,268.18; 15, \$24,362.75; 11, section 1, \$11,228.77.

Sidewalk extension 84, section 1, \$109,300; 98, \$1,579.65; 104, \$251.00; 106, \$218.89; 109, \$3,052.19; 112, \$1,800; 113, \$72.41; 117, \$1,194.65; 122, \$31,791; 131, \$98.29.

In the following cases the cost of improvements was greater than the assessments levied:

Paving extension 27, \$13,611; 26, \$5,895.07.

Sidewalk extension 84, section 2, \$56,530; 90, \$61,941; 112, \$666,76; 123, \$19,919; 124, \$192,80; 125, \$182,25.

MOTHER IN COURT AGAINST CHILD

Salt Lake Woman Resorts to Peculiar Plea to Secure An Estate.

DENIES PARENTAGE OF SON.

Guardian of Youngster Appears to Protect His Rights—Executrix Placed Under Bonds.

In a case in which a mother is engaged in a legal contest against her own minor child had initial hearing before Judge Armstrong in the district court yesterday. The woman is Anna Reinhardt, a local denizen of the under world, who styles herself "Louise Eugenia Du Classe, Countess of France," and she is endeavoring to prove that her son Adrian, aged 11 years, was not the child of her late common law husband, Adrian Pinto, and was never acknowledged as such.

Adrian Pinto, Sr., was a French saloonkeeper of this city, and died a few months ago, leaving an estate of about \$8,000. Miss Reinhardt applied for letters of administration, but before much had been done in the settlement of the estate, there appeared J. W. McKinney, guardian ad litem of Adrian Pinto, Jr., who asked that the executrix be placed under bonds until the child's rights in the premises could be established. Back of the boy's demand for recognition is one Maurice Charoux, a Frenchman, who has had charge of the child almost from its birth, and who claims to have been paid for its care by Adrian Pinto, Sr., for a long time.

Adrian Pinto, Jr., shows strong traces of being a negro blood in his veins, and the contention of the mother is that the child is a Mulatto and not the offspring of the Frenchman. Dr. Grayson was a witness for Miss Reinhardt, and testified that the boy is as much African as white.

Sergt. Roberts said that Pinto, Sr., had acknowledged on several occasions that the child was his, while denials of being the child's parent had been made by Pinto to Sergt. Hemps, according to the latter's testimony.

PLACED UNDER BONDS. Miss Reinhardt was required by the court to furnish a bond in the sum of \$10,000, pending a hearing of the case before a jury.

TWO SENT TO PRISON.

Burglar and Thief Get Three Years Each from Judge Armstrong. Two men were sent to the state prison yesterday by Judge Armstrong, namely, Thomas McKelvey and Olo Olson. The first named was accused of burglary in the second degree, and of 5 papers of the late J. W. McKinney, on the night of March 10. He was sentenced to three years.

Olson was charged with his own admissions, stole a watch from a man he found asleep in a saloon, and he will serve a term of three years for the offense.

AS TO UNCLAIMED BODIES.

County Authorities Notify Undertakers They Will Bury No More.

Undertakers say they have been notified by the county authorities that the county will bury no more unclaimed bodies, as the law provides for their final consignment to the state medical school. The latter is obliged to hold bodies for 90 days in the hope of a possible identification by relatives. At the expiration of the statutory limit, the bodies are buried in the county cemetery for dissection. A case was sent to the school from the insane asylum at Ogden on Monday, and the body was found at the medical school, and found unclaimed and taken to Ogden for burial beside that of her husband.
