# CARRIERS GET RAISED RATE.

Utah Light & Railway Company Notifics Postmaster of Change.

The 3-cent fare for mail carriers will be abolished by the Utah Light & Railway company after Jan. 1, 1909. This step has been decided upon by the company and Postmaster A. L. Thomas has been notified to that effect. The use of these tickets was limited to carriers in uniform engaged in delivering mail In uniform engaged in derivering mater matter and was of great convenience in facilitating the distribution of let-fers and other important mail matter. Now, however, the street railway com-pany claims it is unjust to the com-pany to permit the mail carrier to ride pany to permit the mail carrier to rate any cheaper than any clerk of any de-partment store, or other large corpora-tion employing a large number of hands, and from the beginning of the year will insist that the mail carrier pay the 4-cent fare the same as anyne else who buys a commutation book.
