CONGRESSIONAL.

WASHINGTON, 4.—Hill introduced
and asked for immediate con-
sideration of the increase of the
salary of the President to \$10,000
and the Vice President to \$10,000.

Sherman objected, and the bill
was referred to the Committee on
Electoral.

Consideration of the finance com-
mittee's substitute for Bingham's banking bill was re-
solved several amendments were offered
and rejected.

A copy of the testimony before
Poland's Credit Mobilier Committee
affecting senators was received.

Patents moved for a select com-
mittee of five to consider the testi-
mony, with power to send for per-
sons and papers. Agreed to.

HOUSE.

The bill for the payment of the
Montana war claims passed. Ad-
joined.

Speaker Blaine to-day having
called Dawes to occupy the chair ap-
peared on the floor, saying he had a
few minutes ago had an interview
in the Speaker's room, which had
deeply touched him, it was with
the widow of Robert C. Wood, late
assistant secretary in the U. S. and
daughter of Zachary Taylor, late
President of the U. S. She
had presented a petition which he
would not have read, as it presented
a state of facts that ought not to
be expected, namely, that a daughter
of Zachary Taylor was in need
of assistance. He had assured her
that she believed there would
be a vote against the bill, which he
now introduced, granting to Mr.
Wood a pension of fifty dollars a
month, to date from the death of
her husband, March 2, 1869. The
bill passed by unanimous vote.

EASTERN.

PHILADELPHIA.—Two services
of the Hoboken explosion died
this afternoon, making eleven
deaths in all. Another is reported
dying this evening.

CINCINNATI, 4.—The loss in the
Globe Rolling Mill is \$40,000, insur-
ed \$30,000.

The safe factor of Mosler & Palmer
has been damaged \$8,000 by fire.

LAWRENCE, 4.—Colonel York
was welcomed home to Independ-
ence by a large meeting of citizens
irrespective of party.

Both houses of the Legislature
passed a resolution to form a com-
mittee to investigate the charge of
bribery in the late Senatorial election.

EVANSVILLE, 4.—An accident on
the Louisville road near Guthrie
killed the wife and child of Lieu-
tenant Webster and injured ten
others.

TOPEKA, 4.—The Senate has ap-
pointed the committee to investi-
gate the case of Pomeroy, and the
House has passed one asking Pomeroy
to resign.

New-York, 4.—A man, named
Graham, murdered his wife this
evening in an assignation house, 10
Bleecker Street, and then cut his
own throat. It appears he had
deserted him for a letter carrier. The
wife's remains were taken charge of
by the coroner.

The Roman Catholic bishop has
addressed a memorial to the Pope
protesting against the new law
at the ecclesiastical college
before the Prussian Diet.

PARIS.—A week's mail is now
due from Spain.

The Union newspaper says the
Carlist lines extend through the
northern provinces of Spain, from
Cave Cireux to Corunna. Don Alfonso
is the leader of the Carlists. Many one
of the Carlist generals, has entered Aragon.
Otto commands in Navare. Rodas
is at the head of the right wing.
The Carlists in Asturias are
marching on Leon and Castile.
Lizaraga has command of the
forces in Guipuzcoa. The Union
represents the Carlist cause
flourishing in numbers, arms and
resources.

The argument for stay of proceed-
ings in the Stokes case died to-
day. The judges will render de-
cision in a few days.

WASHINGTON.—The controver-
sy of the national bank bill
which closed the United States banks de-
fended as security for the circulation of
national banks, except upon condi-
tion of substituting new 5 per cent.

Washington.—The Caldwell in-
vestigation was resumed to-day.
Caldwell's statement was read.
