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LAST NIGHT'S DISPATCHES.

CONGRESSIONAL.

SENATE.

WASHINGTON, 4.—Hill introduced and asked for immediate consideration of the increase of the salary of the President to \$50,000 and the Vice President to \$30,000. The bill was referred to the Committee on Elections.

Consideration of the finance committee's substitute for the Buckle bill's banking bill was resumed, and several amendments were offered and rejected.

A copy of the testimony before Poland's Credit Mobilier Committee was received.

Patterson moved for a select committee of five to consider the testimony of the witnesses, and the bill was referred to the Committee on Elections.

HOUSE.

The bill for the payment of the Mohave war claims passed. Adjourned.

Speaker Blaine today having called Daves to occupy the chair afforded on the floor, saying he had a few remarks to make in connection with the Speaker's room, which had been deeply touched by him. It was with the widow of Robert C. Wood, late assistant surgeon in the U. S. army, and the father of the late Taylor, late President of the U. S. She had presented a petition which he would not have read, as it presented a state of facts that ought not to be expected, namely, that a daughter of Zachary Taylor was in need of assistance. He had assured her that he did not believe there would be a vote against the bill which he had introduced, granting to her Wood a pension of fifty dollars a month, to date from the death of her husband, March 2, 1869. The bill passed by unanimous vote.

EASTERN.

PHILADELPHIA.—Two more victims of the cholera epidemic died this afternoon, making eleven deaths in all. Another is reported dying this evening.

CINCINNATI.—The loss in the Cincinnati Mill is \$40,000, insured \$30,000.

The safe factory of Mosler & Palmer has been damaged \$3,000 by fire.

LAWRENCE.—Colonel York was welcomed home to Independence by a large meeting of citizens.

Both houses of the Legislature passed a resolution for a joint committee to investigate the charges of bribery in the late Senatorial election.

EVANSVILLE, 4.—An accident on the Louisville road near Guthrie killed the wife and child of Lieutenant Webster and injured ten others.

TOPEKA, 4.—The Senate has passed the concurrent resolution adding the United States Senate to the list of cases of the Department of the Interior, and the House has passed one asking Henry to resign.

New York, 4.—A man named Benjamin, charged with the murder of a woman, was taken to the hospital, and then to the city of New York.

The case of Graham, an alleged defaulter of the president of the Walker National Bank of Middlebury, New York, came up today, and was adjourned for three months.

The government has not been able to proceed.

The argument for stay of proceedings in the Graham case was heard today. The judge will render a decision in a few days.

WASHINGTON.—The comptroller of the currency has been ordered to change United States bonds deposited as security for the circulation of national bank notes, except upon condition of substituting new ones by July 1, 1873.

Washington.—The case of the United States vs. Corcoran was heard today. The judge will render a decision in a few days.
