Under the heading, "To Store Utah Wool in Boston," the Boston Transcript says:

The officers of the Utah Wool Growers' association, who recently visited Boston, have returned home after mak ing tentative arrangements with local financial interests for the storage of a portion of the Utah clip in this

of a portion of the Utah clip in this city in expectation of thereby securing better returns for their product. A large Boston bank has become interest-ed in the scheme, and arrangements have been made for securing a ware-house at the National docks. Estimates are that between 3,000,000 and 5,000,000 pounds of the clip of the state are in-volved. There is much doubt among Boston wool merchants of the success of the plan. The depressed condition of the market at present makes the time for such a trial inauspicious. Growers can't make a market any more than the dealer, when there is practically no market. It is believed that the experiment will prove to the batter way for them to market their wool than through the legitimate chan-

nels and by the customs that have so long prevailed.

NEW INCORPORATIONS.

The April bulletin of the state board of health shows 365 deaths from all causes, with 38 localities free from contagious diseases. Scarlet fever, 161 cases, 2 deaths; smallpox, 43 cases, no deaths; diphtheria, 74 cases, 10 deaths; typhoid fever, 30 cases, 3 deaths; whooping cough, 77 cases, 2 deaths; measles, 621 cases, 6 deaths; chickenpox, 21 cases, no deaths; pneumonia, 163 cases, 67 deaths; consumption, 15 cases, 8 deaths; deaths.

In a circular to county commissioners, health officers and boards of health, the state board calls attention to arrangenents made for free antitoxin for the Indigent.
