Game Likely to Open in Chicago in a Few Weeks.

A dispatch from Chicago says: Mayor Dunne will next week give out his final decision relative to permitting boxing exhibitions in Chicago during the coming winter.

It is believed that the city will be open to boxing exhibitions in Chicago during the coming winter. The report that the city was off is false and a few alleged promoters who undertook to give boxing shows last Saturday night acted promiscuously and such actions on their part only tend to injure their future chances.

"I have not reached a final decision, but will take up the question with the chief of police and business men this week," said Mayor Dunne.

If the sport can be regulated so that sporting exhibitions may be given purely for the athletes, then I have no objection, but pug-nutted, alleged prize-fighters, scoundrels and rascals must be barred or else there can be no exhibitions of any sort.

"I will ask for opinions from business men who understand the situation. If reputable clubs can give assurance that exhibitions will be purely athletic then I will consent to granting them permission for holding sporting bouts."

"Personally, I can see no harm in boxing any more than I can see in baseball, football, lacrosse or such sports, where anyone is subject to injuries."

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WOMEN MAY TRAIN.

Athletes Will be Open to Them at Y. M. C. A. Building.

The Y. M. C. A. has issued the following announcement concerning gymnastics for women. By its terms classes will be commenced if enough athletes appear to justify the expense, by an early date, the way to become an applicant is set forth as follows:

Twice a week, Wednesday, 6 to 10 p. m., and Friday, 9 to 11:15 a. m., the whole of the physical department is open to members of this section. The classes occur 1:30 Wednesday evening and Friday morning at 10. Each member may attend both classes, subject to the cost of the membership which varies relatively. Directions and requirements for entrance are here summarized:

HERE ARE DIRECTIONS

Secure from association office or from some member a membership application form, fill out and send to association office both blanks accompanied by at least one dollar.

For suit: On the back of the gymnastic application blank, write measurements of (1) waist, (2) chest, and (3) waist line in center of loins. These should be actual measurements, (the manufacturer's measurements are not allowed).

Upon receipt of membership ticket, call at the office to receive the designated time for gymnastic suit and slippers.

EXPENSES.

For membership in both gymnastic classes, per annum, \$10.00. For membership in one gymnastic class, per annum, \$7.00. Gymnastic suit, 4.00. Gymnastic slippers, 1.25.

Total for both classes, \$25.25. Total for one class, \$12.25.

Application blanks must be accompanied by at least one-third of the cost of membership and suit.

MANY APPLICATIONS.

This invitation is extended to the women of the city at no matter of time and money. As a matter of fact in order that the association be justified in taking this time from the men and that no money may be lost, the women should be notified. However, to prove its interest in the needs of the women of the city, the association will meet at the department, if before Oct. 11, applications are filed.

No objection could be raised to this small requirement, for the department will be met with support, the association will withdraw the opportunity with a clear conscience, feeling that the money would be justly the expense. That there is, however, a large interest in gymnastics work among women is evidenced by the fact that some 60 applications have been called for, and it is confidently expected that at least one in eight, or more, will be returned in time to insure the class.
