A BELLIGERENT BAKER Who Ordered a Glass of Beer, Drank it and then Came to Trial.

A belligerent individual, who gave his name as William Ballard, nationality English, age thirty-two and occupation as a baker, was arrested by the police between ten and eleven o'clock this morning and given lodgings in the city jail pending the arraignment of the charge of malicious mischief which has been preferred against him by the proprietor of the Idaho saloon.

The officers say that the accused entered the Idaho saloon on State street and ordered a drink and called for a glass of beer. He was promptly waited upon and swallowed the contents of the glass which had been poisoned. He then turned quickly on his heel and started to leave the place when he was informed by the proprietor that he had failed to pay for the beer. The remainder was followed by the emphatic statement that he didn't pay for the beer, and the police were called. At this the proprietor (who is an Italian) seized him and retreated behind the bar with it with the declaration that he would keep it until the debt was paid. Ballard then became desperate and rushed into the street and picked up a rock and retreated the saloon and hurled the missile with fearful force at the Italian's head. The latter saved the upper part of his anatomy from danger by dodging, but the result was that a \$125 plate mirror was dashed to fragments. A lively scene followed, and the police were called. They arrested Ballard and took him to the station where a carpenter's chest was found concealed in his clothing. Chief Paul says that this particular kind of tool is used as a burglar's jimmy to a considerable extent of late and he believes that they made an important arrest in the person of the man who carried it. He hopes to be able to learn something of the fellow's antecedents later. He is allowed to depart. The defendant was tried this afternoon and found guilty and sent to jail for forty-five days.

The French Premier Challenged by Andrieux.

PARIS, Dec. 28.—The effort of Andrieux to draw Premier Ribot into a duel failed. It is not considered likely that Andrieux will resort to violence, as was at first intimated. There is no doubt the government intended to order his arrest on a charge of treason, the arrest to be effected suddenly and strike terror into the plotters for the overthrow of the administration. Andrieux checked that scheme by boldly proclaiming the government's intentions and the purpose, as explained, to induce him in the task of exposing the Peuma's frauds by committing him to a dangerous trial. He also proclaimed that he had made sure of the security of the evidence under his control, so that the purpose of the government is defeated. This, it is reported, made the ministry hesitate in the purpose of arresting Andrieux without having clear and unambiguous evidence to establish a case against him. The ministry feared the public would interpret a hasty arrest as a proof that the statements of Andrieux as to the motives of the government were true. This would mean the ruin of the cabinet.

When Andrieux arose on Monday morning, still at liberty, he determined on a still bolder move, and that was to give Ribot the choice between a duel or a retraction of the words in which he had accused the cabinet of treason. Andrieux, by putting him to a dangerous trial, the minister of the interior, Andrieux, was not satisfied with the reply, but sent friends to the premier to demand satisfaction. The friends represented that M. Andrieux considered Ribot's words as implying that he, Andrieux, was guilty of a criminal and ignominious act and that he was seeking in an illegitimate manner to arouse disorder and confusion in the cabinet. Andrieux, who declared that he declared on such satisfaction as a duel would give. Ribot replied that he would not give such satisfaction as a duel would give. He declined to discuss the matter any further. Andrieux now states in a letter to the newspapers that Ribot's words could be taken as equivalent to a challenge. Explosion of Dynamite. Destruction of Buildings at Long Island.

LONG ISLAND CITY, I. L., Dec. 28.—A big explosion took place this morning, the dynamite exploded in a start of the new Long Island tunnel near the junction of Jackson and Vernon avenues.
