Reports from England.—A letter

from Elder Royal A. Young, now in England, to Brother Joseph Brockbank, of this city, contains many items of interest to the people of these mountains who come from Great Britain, and we are kindly permitted to make some extracts for the benefit of our readers.

The condition of the people, Brother Young writes, is positively desperate, and the winter is the most severe one for fifty years past, the snow falling almost incessantly during the past month. Traffic is almost stopped, some railroads being completely blocked. The charitable portions of the wealthy classes are doing all they can to relieve the suffering. Soup kitchens are in operation, where a quart of soup costs a penny, which is expected to keep a person alive for 24 hours. There are rumors that the working men are about to strike. If such a thing happens no one can tell what the result will be, as they are reduced to desperation and are determined to make strong efforts for redress. Many of the miners have not done a day's work for 12 months and are dependent entirely on charity.

The people of these mountains

especially the young, do not properly appreciate the privileges and blessings they enjoy here. There never was a time when assistance was more needed or when it would be more thankfully received by the sufferers in England from their more fortunate friends in this country.

Solicitor.—Brother Daniel

Graves, of Provo, writes in connection a tour he has made through Juab, Sevier and Sanpete Counties in the interest of the settlement. An association was formed in Utah County to promote silk raising, which proved so successful that it was thought advisable to organize others throughout the Territory.

To do this Brother Graves left Provo, on the 26th of December and has held 15 meetings in the settlements in the counties above named. He found a willingness and anxiety among the people to engage in the business, and is satisfied that good results will follow. He proposes visiting the settlements of Salt Lake and Eagle Counties as early as possible, after which he will travel through the remaining southern States of the Territory.

Now is the best time, he says, to prepare for securing and planting mulberry trees—he recommends the White Alba variety—and for getting ready for a business which is sure to become a source of wealth to those who engage in it. It will be remembered that several carloads of silk worm eggs have been lately shipped from Japan and California to France and Italy, and that large sums of money have been paid for them.

Our people can raise the silkworm eggs cheaply and in as large quantities as any community can, and the experience of the past three years shows that the business can be made a most prosperous one.
