

HYLAND KNOCKS  
OUT FINUCANEChicago Boy Lasts Only Three  
Rounds in Bout With  
Fighting Dick.

MANY SALT LAKERS THERE.

Contes a Fast One From Start to Fin-  
ish and Thought of Short Duration  
Pleased Fight Fans.A series of vicious rights to the body,  
left uppercuts to the jaw, followed by a  
left to the solar plexus and a hard right  
to the jaw proved the superiority of  
Finucane in his bout with "Fighting Dick"  
Hyland at the Auditorium roller skating  
rink in Ogden last night.While it lasted the bout was a fast  
one and pleased the 2,000 fight fans pres-  
ent. The end came in the third round and  
would have been over with in the second  
but for Hyland's wildness in trying to  
put over his man away. In the second, Finu-  
cane was tottering about the ring all  
but out while Hyland was trying to  
recover and managed to get back in the  
ring. In the third he came back in  
his usual aggressive manner, but was  
met with terrific rights and lefts from  
Hyland and finally sank to the floor while  
the referee counted the fatal ten.The contest drew a large crowd from  
Salt Lake and out for the loyal fight fans  
of this city the attendance was really  
beastly. The special trains over the  
J.P. & N. line carried over 1,000 to and  
from the Junction City.The fighters entered the ring at each  
weigh-in despite the assertion that both  
were under 125. As a matter of fact both  
were under that weight. Just before the  
fight started the first round Hyland was  
going to the "Nose" that he was over 125  
pounds and that there was practically no  
difference in the weight between him and  
Finucane. Hyland was in superb condi-  
tion, but the same cannot be said of the  
Chicago boy. Before the first round was  
over with Finucane's body showed the  
effects of his efforts and the blows land-  
ed by Hyland. He was game, however,  
and the aggressor during the first round

first and it looked like Finucane had a  
good chance to win. He landed several  
blows at the close of the round and  
started out well in the second. He shook

for the count. It was a complete  
knockout. After Finucane was taken to  
his corner his second made a weak claim  
of foul. They called a physician to ex-  
amine the boxer in the man of medicine  
stated that Finucane was not hit too low  
but was "hit too hard."An interesting preliminary Mickey  
McCallister was awarded the decision over  
Kid Herick in the second round  
and a fourth. The boxer was taken to  
his room or two but no damage was
