

LOCAL AND OTHER MATTERS.

THEATRICAL.—Last night Mr. Waldron renewed his acquaintance with our theatre-goers, appearing as Richelieu. He was greeted with a most cordial welcome, the applause being loud and prolonged. The playing through the piece was very good. Mr. Waldron's impersonation of the "Cardinal King" elicited frequent marks of approbation from an appreciative audience, though the sudden and severe storm which set in late in the afternoon militated against the house. He has improved since he went east, as a young, rising and ambitious actor might be expected to do. His enunciation, where voice-muscles require rapid and forcible utterance, is clearer and more distinct. Mr. McKenzie's Mansur, Mr. Lindsay's Barradas, Mr. Margett's Beringen, Mr. Graham's King, Miss Adams' Francois, and Miss Colebrook's Julie were all good and carefully played.

We shall expect during Mr. Waldron's brief engagement some very fine and enjoyable performances.

To-morrow night will be presented one of his specialties, "Nick of the Woods, or the Jibbenhamony," in which he sustains a number of characters. Mrs. Waldron makes her first appearance here as Telle Due, in the piece, which is well cast, and is a most exciting one. Stirring and sensational scenes of frontier life mark its progress, and the descent of the "Jibbenhamony" down the foaming cataract in a blazing canoe, is one of the most thrilling and sensational effects presented on the stage. The rear-guardance of "Slasher and Crasher" will follow.

POLITICAL.—A. Jones, Mat. Karney and Harmon Dillmore were brought before Alderman Richards this forenoon, the first named on a charge of drunkenness and drawing a knife with intent to assault, and the other two charged with drunkenness and disturbing the peace. They were fined respectively \$15, \$5 and \$10.

U. P. R. R.—On the 12th inst., a grader-camp of one hundred and fifty-five men, moved from the Black Hills to the vicinity of Rock Creek. All the graders on the road are supplied with good repeating rifles, which are kept in readiness for Indian attacks. So says the Cheyenne Leader.

Poisoned.—On Wednesday evening Dr. Tait was called in to attend to a couple of boys, children of Mr. Levy, who had been poisoned by eating peach pits. The children, one three and the other seven years of age, were in a most dangerous condition, but skill and care preserved them from the death which threatened. Peach pits are said to contain three times as much poison in spring as in autumn. Parents will be wise if they make a note of this case.

FOREIGN PORTAGE.—A correspondent from Sanpete having suggested the propriety of our publishing the reduced rates of postage between the United States and Europe, via the North German Union, we have obtained the following from A. W. Street, Esq., Postmaster of this city:

The postage to Austria by North German Union direct, is ten cents; to closed mail, via England, fifteen cents. To Denmark, by North German Union, fourteen cents, via England eighteen cents; if prepaid, one cent less either way. To Britain twenty cents. To Norway, via North German Union, twenty-three cents, if prepaid, twenty cents. To Sweden, via North German Union, eighteen cents, if prepaid, sixteen cents. To Switzerland, direct closed mail via England, fifteen cents. These rates are for letters under half an ounce.

There are fines on unpaid Foreign Letters which should also be known. By the postal conventions between the United States and the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, the North German Union, Belgium, the Netherlands, Italy and Switzerland, each country collects for itself the amount of fine imposed on unpaid and insufficiently paid matter arriving in that country. The United States has fixed the fine on such matter arriving here at five cents for each letter or other postal packet. The fines chargeable on such matter arriving in the foreign countries named are: In Great Britain, 6d; North German Union, not exceeding 2 silbergroschen; Belgium, 3d; centimes; the Netherlands, not exceeding 15 centimes (Dutch); Italy, not exceeding 20 centimes; Switzerland, not exceeding 25 centimes. These fines are for each unpaid or insufficiently paid letter or other postal packet, and not on each rate.
