

IMPORTANT PETITIONS.

Suit Planted by the American Loan and Trust Company.

In Replevin to the U. S. L. and T. and S. Railroad Company.

In the Third district court last evening the American Loan and Trust Company, trustee of the consolidated bonds of the Oregon Short Line & Utah Northern Railway company, by their attorneys, Messrs. Henshaw, McCall and Greney, filed a bill of complaint against the Oregon Short Line & Utah Northern, and one against the Union Pacific, in which the same recovery for lost system of bonds were sought.

It is stated that August 1, 1899, the Oregon Short Line & Utah Northern railway company, for the purpose of securing certain bonds, known as the consolidated bonds of the company, payable April 1, 1911, or earlier, as therein provided, with interest at the rate of 4 per cent per annum, executed a mortgage on all the lines of the railway company as consolidated, to the amount of \$1,000,000, to be secured by the mortgage of the bonds of the company.

The total amount secured by these bonds was \$1,000,000. The total amount of the bonds issued was \$1,000,000.

The petitioners believe if the railway property of the defendant were properly managed and worked separately for its benefit and not as a part and for the benefit of the Union Pacific or any other system, the same would be able to pay its debts and interest on its bonds.

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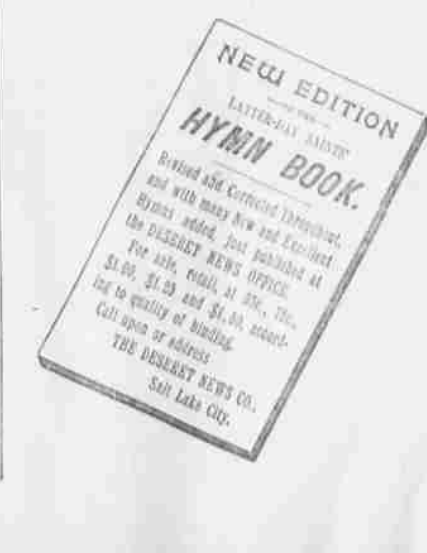
