FRAGMENTS.

The Soda Springs excursion party will leave the Utah Central depot at 4 o'clock to-morrow afternoon.

The trial of a couple of young thieves charged with stealing harness, etc., has been set for this afternoon at 3 o'clock.

The trial of the two soldiers charged with being drunk and disorderly and disturbing the peace is still proceeding. The examination of witnesses is, however, nearly at an end.

"A POLICEMAN'S lot is not a happy one"—at least the city marshal and one of his side think so after Saturday night's experience. They were called away down to the Soda Springs depot that evening by the striking report that an old man had been shot in a most cowardly manner by a desperado wearing "ragged pants and an open shirt front." The zealous officers took one of the best and the fastest horses in town and flew to the scene of expected gore,—only to find that the offending citizen in a fit of precaution, had been shooting a newly purchased pistol into his lucerne patch. The "Captain" just wants to catch the small boy who gave the first alarm, and the enterprising reporter who followed it up and saw the chagrined crawling over the faces of the sold peace-preservers.

An unholy row, consisting of fighting, cursing, yelling, etc., was kicked up on Second South Street last night by a crowd of drunken rowdies from Fort Douglas. They knocked each other about in the most approved manner, until some had to be kicked off the sidewalk insensible. A legal gentleman living near by was disturbed by the racket and telephoned to the City Hall for the police, a small squad of whom promptly sallied out, and after some persuasion succeeded in getting the howlers to go off peacefully. It is reported this morning, however, that the drunken gang hooded and yelled all through the eastern part of the city. They were about 20 to 30 strong, but respected the few police sufficiently to move off, and that quickly, when told to do so.

LOCAL NEWS.

"Ma" Smoot's Condition.—The latest heard from Sister Margaret T. Smoot, is that she is gradually and hourly failing. She could not be dressed yesterday morning, and had become so weak and helpless, as to be unable to sit up. It is probable that her sufferings will soon be at an end.

Bishop Hardy's Condition.—Bishop L. W. Hardy's condition was said to be improving this morning about 8 o'clock, but another report at 11 o'clock said he was still in the straits which came over him last night, and from which he could not be roused. He was taking nourishment, such as a little beef tea, but the plethra was gathering in his throat, and considerable anxiety was felt by his watchers. Last evening he desired to get up, and was helped across the room by two of his sons, but went back to bed soon and fell into the slumber in which he still is, or was at last accounts.

Accidentally Drowned.—About 7 o'clock in the evening of July 26 a little child twenty-two months old, son of Mr. John D. Lewellyn, of Scofield, Utah, was missed from home and could not be found. The people turned out en masse and searched up and down the creek, among the hills and in every nook and corner where it was thought possible the child might be found. Search was kept up until morning, but owing to the darkness it was not successful until after daylight, when the body of the child was found in the creek. He had been twice attempting to cross the creek on the railroad bridge, and it is supposed that in making the attempt the third time, unobserved, he had fallen in. His head and face were badly bruised and discolored by the fall. This is the eighth child out of a family of nine that has been taken away from this earth to a better home. The parents have the sympathy of the entire community in their sad bereavement.

Pay Templeton.—Miss Templeton is pretty and sprightly. She affects the French school, which is probably right enough in France, but not in Utah. "Girois" is nothing if not French; but it is an affection which an American actress must be very careful how she puts on. Oates is absolutely vulgar in her physical efforts to make French opera what Almas makes it. Miss Templeton happily acquiesces in this, as she is as old as Oates is. She is graceful and her movements are sinuous with possibly too much of abandon in them. All in all, she has about every qualification which an opera bouffe singer needs. Her voice is not phenomenal; but it is sweet and flexible. Last night she attempted to sing with a contralto voice, a soprano part critically. She found it necessary to cat her voice, and in the second act, she did not go to attempt it for badly sung the particular dirge is abominable, and it is more unlike any music, anyway. She sang the woe song very well, and her acting accompanied it was all that could be asked of a Deaver Republican.

Missionary Experience.—A letter from Elder Samuel W. Musser, now laboring as a missionary in Germany, written from Mauthausen, in the city, gives some very interesting incidents of his experience. We have been permitted to extract the following:

"Last week I was at a village about 15 miles from here and stayed two days. Yesterday morning a sister from there told me that at 11 o'clock on the night of the 1st of July two policemen came to her home to arrest her, and that they would not believe her, so they began a search. They ransacked the house and examined closets, and not finding me they ransacked the loft above, which is used as a granary. They then searched through the garden. Their object was to arrest me, and they promised the sister that if ever they overtook me they would behead me with 20 marks. On the second of this month Brother Brock, one of the local Elders of this city, had to appear before the mayor and undergo a cross-examination as to the charges against me. On a previous occasion he was summoned before the police, where he was asked a good many questions, such as how we prayed, to whom we prayed, what kind of clothes we wore while praying, how we baptized females, and a host of others. The mayor was good enough to say that if I would recant my doctrines then we could hold meetings here."

TERRITORIAL ITEMS.

SUMMARIZED FROM LATEST EXCHANGES.

Ingerson, the noted atheist, has commenced singing in Montana.

There has already been one arrest under the new prohibitory ordinance in Provo.

For the next Montana Territorial Fair premiums to the amount of \$11,000 have been offered.

A new republican paper called the Tribune will shortly be published in Rawlins, Wyo.

The Beaver Co-op, still keeps up the heavy shipment of mining timbers to the Horn Silver Mine.

Montana proudly claims to be better off financially than any other western State or Territory.

The semi-weekly Beaver County Record only appears once a week now, owing to the non-arrival of paper.

Fire in St. John, Arizona, on the 12th inst., destroyed the house and summer kitchen of Ole Jensen. Loss about \$400.

Eight thousand men are at work repairing the roads of New Mexico, the damage to which so far as heard from, amounts to over \$1,000,000.

The autumn horse races in Helena, Montana, are likely to be interesting and well patronized. A large number of horses are there in training.

A "six days" session of the school teachers of Utah County is to be held on the 1st of August in the grove, during the third week in August.

Hon. D. P. Peery, Mayor of Ogden, returned last Friday evening from a several weeks' trip to the States. He was accompanied by his son Mr. D. H. Peery, Jun.

Montana would be a good place to transport our burglars to. During the past three weeks no fewer than thirteen castles here have been burgled or shot in that energetic Territory.

An Ogden milkman is in trouble. A large cow, living spring on his ranch has given out, leaving a fifteen foot hole. Too bad, that the best cow of all should thus prematurely "dry up."

Night before last the residence of Henry Mortenson, near the Driving Park, Ogden, was totally destroyed by fire. Nearly all the furniture was saved. Loss \$1,500, insurance \$1,500.

The coroner's jury who sat upon the body of Patrick Egan, shot on the 7th of July in Park City, reported in the last issue that the shot was fired by Murphy "with felonious intent."

One-third of the grain crop at Adamsville, Beaver County, has been utterly destroyed by the recent frosts, and the entire potato crop has been killed in both Adamsville and Greenville.

A boy named Thomas Walker, of Parley's Park, was thrown from a horse last Wednesday and seriously hurt, by being dragged in the halter strap and kicked about the head and neck. His life is almost despaired of.

An Ogden paper says the Fay Templeton company will appear in the Opera House there next Friday night. We thought Salt Lake was to have the honor, and have been saying so all along. Who's right?

It is rumored that the Utah Central railroad has decided to construct an eight mile switch from Millford to the mouth of the Cave Mine Cañon, Beaver County, and that about one hundred laborers will be set to work on the work early next week.

Severe frosts on the nights of the 15th, 16th and 18th inst., were general throughout Beaver, Iron, Garfield, Piute and perhaps other counties. In one district in Garfield Co., nearly the whole wheat crop was destroyed, and it is being cut for hay.

Mr. A. L. Tenny, of St. John, Arizona, has been indicted for polygamy, appeared before the Commissioner on the 15th inst. to answer to the charge. The prosecution not being ready to proceed, the case was continued till the 22d of August, the defendant giving bonds in \$5,000.

Last Saturday morning about two o'clock, the saw mill of Mr. Josiah M. Ferrin, of Eden, in Wolf Creek Cañon, Weber County, was burned. The man who had charge of the mill narrowly escaped. His boots, some of his clothes, about \$100 worth of tools, and 3,000 feet of lumber were destroyed, besides the mill, which was worth between four and five hundred dollars.

Harvey White, of Pleasant Grove, a young son of the same parents who lost a child by drowning a short time ago, particularly of which said event were published in these columns at the time, had the misfortune on Saturday last to break his left wrist, through the capzling of a load of hay on which he was riding. General sympathy is expressed for the afflicted and unfortunate family.
