Affairs in Peru.—The United States Consul H. M. Brent at Callao has issued his annual report to the Department of State, and in it has outlined the situation in Peru. Mr. Brent says: "I am unable to chronicle any improvement or unfavorable change in the general economic condition of Peru. The armed conflict between the Government and the rebels still continues in the principal cities in the south and in the mercantile and agricultural districts. The rebels are in the possession of the rebellion, obeying the orders of General Bolognesi, the leader of the revolution. Commerce, the humane and fruitful interior back of Lima, whence the great wealth of the country has been reached the capital in normal times, has been almost completely interrupted since the departure of the Chileans in 1883, a consequence of the fact that the exports from these sections are sent to the coast by sea, and are subject to the whims of the waves, and are subject to seizure and confiscation on the way. The stores of the Government and the storehouses of Lima, filled with goods, are waiting for foreign purchasers. Lima merchants have been unable to export their goods abroad. General Sewell, chief revenue agent in charge of the investigation in Philadelphia, said to-day that the Washington, D. C., office had accomplished all they set out to do. It was found that means had been resorted to for the purpose of obtaining information from recording the actual contents of the barrels.
