A DOUBLE MURDER.

A GENERAL COURTMARTIAL.

Occures in Chickashaw Nation, Being Followed by a Lynching.

Oklahoma City, O. T., May 23.—It is learned here today that a double mur-der to cover a robbery, followed by a lynching, has occurred in the wilds of the mountains in the Chickashaw na-tion. The affair occurred two weeks ago. The participants in the tragedy were mountaineers who agreed among themselves to keep the affair secret. Two weeks ago an unknown man

Two weeks ago an unknown man went to the home of R. T. Tutt, who lives near the base of the mountains, and dentanded food. He was refused by Mrs. Tutt, who found it necessary to enforce her refusal by the display of to enforce her refusal by the display of a gun. A few days later at a nearby farm which was occupied by two maid-en women was broken into, the sisters shot in an endeavor to protect them-selves, and robbed of \$700 in cash. Neighbors discovered the deed and a posse was organized. The murderer was trailed to the woods, and upon his discovery was shot down in cold blood. Upon the return of the boys from the woods the only remarks in response to woods the only remarks in response to inquiries were, "Well they guessed he would not rob nor murder anybody

BOOK OF FORMS.

Compromise Reached by Omitting

Word "Authorized."

Des Moines, May 23.—The famous controversy and debate over the pro-posed Presbyterian book of forms ended in the general assembly late this afternoon in a compromise in which all words that might indicate that the hook is authorized were stricken from the resolutions and the text and title pages of the book itself, and in which pages of the book listif, and in which resolution of opposition was also in-corporated, declaring specifically that the assembly made no recommenda-tions with reference to it. With these limitations the report of Dr. Henry Van Dyke's committee was adopted and all bitterness between the factions avoided

The book of forms will continue to be published, but nowhere on its pages be published, but nowhere on its pages will be found anything to indicate that it hears any authority from the Pres-byterian general assembly, all such words and phrases having been strick en out. It will be published merely "for the purpose contemplated by the general assembly of 1905," and "for voluntary use." By its action today

general assembly of 1905," and "for voluntary use," By its action today the assembly virtually rescinded the action of the three preceding assem-biles of 1903, 1904 and 1905, in which progressive steps were taken for an authorized book of forms. The compromise was agreed upon today after numerous conferences be-tween Dr. Van Dyke, Dr. Moffatt and Dr. William F. Acchaley of Cincin-nati, the latter leader of the opposi-tion. The resolutions offered this af-ternoon were in accord with the un-derstanding reached by them, and the vote was unanimous. vote was unanimous.
