

## CHINESE BOYCOTT AND EXCLUSION.

The Heathens Cannot See Why Tit for Tat is Not Good Policy.

### COMM'R SARGENT'S REPORT.

Coolies Have Been Able to Secure Certificates Without Difficulty.

Washington, May 23.—Secy. Metcalf, complying with a resolution of the house, has sent to that body a long report from Commissioner Sargent of the immigration bureau, giving the history of the enforcement of the Chinese exclusion law.

The last chapter of the report deals with the Chinese boycott of American goods, and reproduces official proclamations of Chinese officials, which, despite assertions to the contrary, show that the Chinese government is at least not discouraging the boycott.

In July of last year an official proclamation was made by the Chinese general at San Francisco to Chinese in this country. The official translation of it contains this language: "The Chinese exclusion act of the United States is what Chinese merchants at all ports desire to retaliate against by means of commercial boycott on American goods."

The report states that at the time this proclamation was issued, however, reports had come from Minister Hsueh in China "that the Chinese government is vigorously opposing the threatened boycott of American goods."

St. Petersburg, May 23.—The following official statement of the government justifying the refusal to grant plenary amnesty was given out tonight and made publishable in all the papers of Russia tomorrow morning:

"The question of full political amnesty which has been raised in parliament and which is included in the lower house's address to the emperor and supported by several organs of the Russian press is far from meeting with a sympathetic response from all sections of Russian society.

"It is impossible to avoid noticing a strong current of feeling against full amnesty in different classes of the population, where, it is pointed out, political assassinations do not cease. News is daily telegraphed from the provinces of fresh murders or attempts to murder officials. In the presence of such an irreconcilable disposition on the part of the adepts of the terrorist societies the government cannot expose the peaceful, right thinking section of the population to danger. The government cannot refrain from bringing to justice terrorists and bomb throwers. It cannot deliver from punishment by judicial sentence people who have committed and still are committing such crimes.

"Concerning those who have been arrested by administrative organs, many already have been and others will be liberated after careful investigation of the cause of arrest. The full pardon of these is a possibility, and it may also be possible to abrogate definitely by legislative order states of war, extraordinary defense, etc., and further to institute judicial proceedings in localities where the revolutionary movement displays itself. Judicial repression at present is impossible in those districts, owing to the terrorizing and assassination excesses of terrorists. But the over-excited state of public feeling above all in the districts referred to is unpropitious to the revision or abrogation of exceptional laws.

"Such is the opinion of the impossibility and inopportune of full amnesty entertained by those sections of society which, refusing to be carried away by preconceived views, face the reality of things in Russia in a reasonable spirit."

### MRS. AGNES MYERS.

Movement Started to Save Her From Hanging.

Kansas City, May 23.—A movement to prevent the hanging of Mrs. Agnes Myers, whose execution for the murder of her husband was yesterday set for June 23, was begun today. Petitions urging the governor to commute the woman's sentence to life imprisonment were circulated here and other pressure will be brought upon the governor.

## REFUSAL TO GRANT FULL AMNESTY.

Russian Government Issues a Statement Justifying Its Course in Matter.

### STRONG CURRENT AGAINST IT.

Complete Pardon of Those Arrested By Administrative Order is a Possibility.

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### A GENERAL COURT-MARTIAL.

Ordered for Trial of Capt. Garst for Grounding the Rhode Island.

Washington, May 23.—A general court martial has been ordered for the trial of Capt. Perry Garst, commanding the battleship Rhode Island, for grounding that ship May 6 on York Spit.

### A DOUBLE MURDER.

Occurs in Chickasaw Nation, Being Followed by a Lynching.

Oklahoma City, O. T., May 23.—It is learned here today that a double murder to cover a robbery, followed by a lynching, has occurred in the wilds of the mountains in the Chickasaw nation. The affair occurred two weeks ago. The participants in the tragedy were mountaineers who agreed among themselves to keep the affair secret.

Two weeks ago an unknown man went to the home of R. T. Tutt, who lives near the base of the mountains, and demanded food. He was refused by Mrs. Tutt, who found it necessary to enforce her refusal by the display of a gun. A few days later at a nearby farm which was occupied by two maid-servants, the unknown man, the sisters shot in an endeavor to protect themselves, and robbed of \$700 in cash.

Neighbors discovered the deed and a posse was organized. The murderer was trailed to the woods, and upon his return the boys from the woods the only remarks in response to inquiries were, "Well they guessed he would not rob nor murder anybody else."

### BOOK OF FORMS.

Compromise Reached by Omitting Word "Authorized."

Des Moines, May 23.—The famous controversy and debate over the proposed Presbyterian book of forms ended in the general assembly late this afternoon in a compromise in which all words that might indicate that the book is authorized were stricken from the resolutions of the assembly. The book of forms was also incorporated, declaring specifically that the assembly made no recommendations with reference to it. With these limitations the report of Dr. Henry Van Dyke's committee was adopted and all bitterness between the factions avoided.

The book of forms will continue to be published, but nowhere on its pages will be found anything to indicate that it bears any authority from the Presbyterian general assembly, all such words and phrases having been stricken out. It will be published merely for the purpose contemplated by the general assembly of 1905, and "for voluntary use." By its adoption the assembly virtually rescinded the action of the three preceding assemblies of 1903, 1904 and 1905, in which progressive steps were taken for an authorized book of forms.

The compromise was agreed upon today after numerous conferences between Dr. Van Dyke, Dr. Moffatt and Dr. William F. McAuley of Cincinnati, the latter leader of the opposition. The resolutions offered this afternoon were in accord with the understanding reached by them, and the vote was unanimous.

## EQUITABLE LIFE POLICYHOLDERS.

Paul Morton Sends Out Circular Regarding the Amended Charter.

### ARE TO ELECT 28 DIRECTORS.

Mr. Cleveland Says He Believes It Will Accomplish Object in View.

New York, May 23.—The following statement was issued today by Paul Morton, president of the Equitable Life Assurance society:

"We have mailed to each of the directors of the society a proposed amended charter of the Equitable which provides that 28 directors shall be elected directly by the policyholders at the annual meeting to be held next December, and that thereafter the policyholder directors shall always constitute a majority of the board. This amended charter, which embodies all promises made by Mr. Ryan voluntarily at the time he purchased his stock and repeated by the board of directors before the Amended charter was adopted, and strong committee will come before the board of directors at the regular monthly meeting on May 31 for their consideration."

"It provides that the 28 policyholder directors shall be elected with the same formalities and are succeeded to the same safeguards as are guaranteed by the existing law for the election of strictly mutual insurance companies."

"The policyholders are already well represented in the Equitable board, as a majority of the existing directors are recommended by or upon the recommendation of Mr. Cleveland and his associates after communication with the policyholders at large."

"I should add that the trustees who vote in majority of the stock of the society and Mr. Ryan, the owner of the stock, are heartily in favor of giving the policyholders the right to elect a majority of the directors, and that the proposed amended charter comes before the board of directors with the approval of Mr. Cleveland and his associates as soon as the opportunity is given Mr. Ryan's stock will be voted for its adoption."

"We are advised by counsel that the injunction order now in force will have to be modified before formal action can be taken upon this charter, and we have instructed counsel to apply to the court at once for the necessary modification of the order."

Accompanying the copy of the amended charter mailed to each of the directors was a copy of a letter dated May 22, addressed by Mr. Cleveland to President Morton, in which Mr. Cleveland says:

"The draft of an amended charter which has been prepared by Mr. Cleveland and submitted to the trustees, seems to adequately accomplish the object we have in view. It contemplates the vacation of the terms of those among the present directors whose terms in any event would expire in December next, and also of the 13 directors elected in December, 1906, to serve until December, 1907. This seems to be a very essential feature of the plan suggested for the orderly and effective inauguration of policyholder directors by policyholders for policyholder directors. I have not, however, supposed that it would be to separate from the board actually and finally any of the present directors who have been elected during the last few months by the trustees or upon their recommendation, and I hope I may be allowed to suggest that the names of all of these directors be placed upon the so-called 'administration ticket' to be presented to the policyholders of the society for their suffrage in December next."

"I request that a meeting of the stockholders be called for some day, as early in June as practicable so that the necessary action by the majority of the stock may be secured."

### ROJESTVENSKY RESIGNS.

St. Petersburg, May 23.—Emperor Nicholas today accepted the resignation of Admiral Rojestvensky, which was tendered on the ground of ill-health, following wounds received in the war with Japan.

### SENATOR BURTON DOES NOT CONTEMPLATE RESIGNING.

Washington, May 23.—At the request of Senator Burton, whose case recently has been decided by the supreme court adversely, a conference was held today between himself and the chairman of the senate committee on privileges and elections, Senator Burrows. The subject of the conference was to gain some knowledge of the proposed procedure by Senator Burrows' committee regarding the resolution introduced by Senator Hale, Senator Burton contemplates resigning. The fact that his stay has been granted by the supreme court granting him 60 days in which to file an application for re-hearing leaves his status, he contends, just where it was previous to the decision of the court and that no action is necessary by the senate that would not have been necessary before the recent decision was rendered. Senator Burrows said the committee would take all these questions into consideration when it met to take up the resolution.

### FEDERATION OF MUSICIANS.

Boston, May 23.—The principal business before the convention of the American Federation of Musicians in Faneuil Hall today was the hearing of the appeal of Walter Damrosch, leader of the New York Symphony orchestra, who had been fined \$1,000 by the New York union for the alleged importation of five foreign musicians into this country a year ago. Mr. Damrosch paid the fine, but he protested, and appealed for a hearing before the convention. The convention today decided against Mr. Damrosch.

### RESIGNATION ACCEPTED.

Washington, May 23.—The president has formally accepted the resignation of Hon. A. Taylor, an assistant secretary of the treasury, to take effect June 30, the close of this fiscal year. He will soon leave for a tour of the world, which will occupy two years or more.

Mr. Taylor will be succeeded by J. H. Edwards, now secretary to Secy. Shaw, whose appointment and confirmation by the senate have already been announced. Mr. Edwards will be succeeded as secretary to Secy. Shaw by Arthur P. Statter, who was originally an Iowa man. Mr. Statter had had 10 years' experience as a newspaper man in Sioux City, and at Walla Walla, Wash., where he was for a time editor of the Walla Walla Union. Since 1903 he has been private secretary to Senator Anthony and clerk to the senate committee on irrigation.
