Mr. Mason, our informant, lives on a farm which belonged to the Saints. once He is seventy-one years of are. and although he was bitter against the Saints, he seemed pleased with being able to polut out to us the various bends on the Big Blue, where the humble log cabins of the Sainta once stood. At several points there are still remnants to be found of the chimneys and foundations, but not a single house is known to be in existence. The residence of Brother Joshua Lewis, in which the Church held its Fifth General Conference, Aug 4, 1831, crumbled to pieces years ago. That was one of the few buildings not burned by the mob at the time of the exodus, but it

was partly torn down. Mr. Mason also told us where the skirmish took place between the Saints and the mob, Nov. 4, 1833, when Andrew Barber and two of the mob were killed From Mr. Mason's house we con-tinued our journey to the house of Geo. P. Frisbey, a member of the Hedrichite faction, where these lines
