RESULT AT LEHI.

Only One Democrat Elected on Factory City Ticket.

Lehi, Nov. 5.—Thomas Webb, Republican, was elected mayor of Lehi yesterday, by a vote of 414, while his opponent, A. M. Davis, Democrat, received 228. The vote in general averaged about the figures named, except that Henry East, Democratic nominee for marshal, received 311 votes as against 232 for J. N. Butt, Republican, nearly winning out as a sequel of his success as a vote getter.

The surprise of the day was the fact that Joseph W. Goates, Dem., beat Farley Austin, Republican, in the contest for councilman for the four-year term, receiving 145 to Austin's 135. Goates was the only Democrat elected.

Following are the other officers elected: Recorder, George A. Goates; treasurer, John T. Winn; marshal, J. N. Butt; justice of the peace, Samuel Taylor; councilmen, two-year term, Jonas Holdsworth, Leroy Lott and Henry Lewis.

A proposition for a tax levy of one mill for the establishment of a free library and gymnasium was defeated by a vote of three to one.

MANTI DIVIDED.

Democrats: Ernest Munk, 4-year councilman; marshal, Neel Bessy; and Andrew O. Anderson, 2-year councilman; C. E. Carlson, justice of the peace.

Between 750 and 800 votes were cast. The highest majority went to Ernest Munk, with 141, while Christensen Axelson, recorder, came lowest, with a majority.

DEATH OF RICHARD NEWMAN.

Telegram from Oakland Announces Passing of Youthful Genius.

"Richard at rest." These words in a telegram received here last night from Oakland, Cal., told the death of little Richard Newman, and the ending of four years of suffering such as come into few lives of such short early duration. Only a week ago the "News" published some pieces of verse written by the child, together with the announcement that his 5th birthday celebration would be held at the home of his parents, and that he would be 6 years old on the 11th of this month.

Almost the last earthly thing which claimed the little boy's attention was the "News" article, and so great was his pleasure and encouragement in the praise, that he at once set about writing what would have been probably the most pretentious of his many literary efforts. But it was never finished—at least for earthly eyes.

What expression the marvelously bright intellect may have hereafter will only be limited by eternity, where no physical nor mental agony will obstruct its play. That he has been spared the trial of an earthly pilgrimage beset by such affliction is for him a superlative blessing; but the blow is to the sorrowing mother, left in every sense desolate by his loss. Only four years ago, the father passed suddenly away; and the recent bereavement robs her of the one solace of her widowhood. It makes the trial doubly hard, and the deepest sympathy of her many friends will go out to her in this new grief.

Little Richard Newman is the son of the late Henry J. and Mrs. Charlotte Newman, formerly of Salt Lake, and was born in this city on Feb. 14, 1894. At an early age he met with an accident from which his later affliction resulted, the trouble beginning to seriously develop four years ago. After receiving medical service here he was taken two years ago to a private sanitarium in Oakland, Cal., where, with his mother, he remained till his death. From the beginning he has suffered more or less constant agony; but notwithstanding this, his mind, always marvelously active, retained its wonderful vigor, surpassing all who came into contact with him by its precociousness. Had life and health been his portion, the world undoubtedly would have seen in him a man of pronounced mark. He was to a higher field with the love and admiration of many warm friends encompassing him, and grieving for his sudden life.

May that One in whose bosom these little children rest make right the unhappy years which have been his earthly lot.

TRIES TO SUICIDE WITH SHOESTRING

Inmate of City Jail Could Not Find Rope and Made Noose of Cord.

John Kelly, arrested Sunday for drunkenness and sentenced Monday to serve five days in the city jail, tried to commit suicide by hanging, this morning. Kelly could not find a rope, but decided that a couple of shoestrings would do. He fastened the strings together, made a noose which he placed around his neck, fastened the other end to the bars of his cell and tried to strangle himself. His fellow prisoners at once gave the alarm and Jailer Wilkinson quickly cut the man down and removed him to another part of the jail.

Kelly insisted that he would not live. He declared he wanted to die and wanted to hang himself. He begged Jailer Wilkinson to procure a rope or give him a gun.

In all probability Kelly will be charged with insanity and sent to the state mental hospital at Provo.

AMUSEMENTS.

A good house greeted the March King and his superb company of artists yesterday afternoon, in the Tabernacle, and it speaks well for the musical taste and discrimination of the audience that it expressed its manifest appreciation of the more severely classical numbers on the program, as well as of the lighter selections. A noticeable instance was the Laxi Symphonic Poem, "Les Preludes." This impressive work is unusually difficult for band performance, particularly with the reed section. It includes love songs, large, with majestic, if not overpowering harmonies at the close. It requires not only intelligence, but uncommon technical abilities to convey this poem, to bring out its manifold lights and shadows, the varied conceptions of human experience. The band, however, was fully equal to all requirements of the occasion. Another gem, and a veritable surprise party, was the famous "Lullaby Sextet," by band and organ. It is not drawing a long bow to say that the like of it was never heard here before. An unusually large and varied aggregation of adjectives would be necessary to come anywhere near describing it. Both band and organ were perfectly together for every move of Mr. Souss's baton, and the working up of the crescendo to the climax held the house in breathless suspense, a brilliant burst of concerted melody was awe-inspiring. The cornet solos of Mr. Clarke were up to his high standard, the "Rosary" by Nevin being especially affecting, while his own "Up the Hudson," pair of marked sweetness and brilliancy. The ladies also did well; Miss Allen in the "Infammatu" being effective with organ accompaniment, and Miss Powers' violin solo showed a technical accomplishment highly creditable to her. She is a charming little woman. The Sousa marches were, as usual, appreciated to the echo, and he was very graceful in responding. The remarkable capabilities of that band were well brought out at the matinee. To say it is the finest concert band in the world is no exaggeration.

Souss's night program was a feast of riches, indeed it was rather an embarrassment of riches, for the audience clapped for an hour and a half, and the leader was so obliging that it was close to 11 o'clock before adjournment. As usual the encores were the big popular features of the night and such selections as "The Little Lullaby," "The Captain's Experience," "The Stars and Stripes," etc., were met with a rush of enthusiasm after the several numbers of the program. The Weber march by Gorman had a fine reception, the audience heading in to applaud the movement introducing "The Men of Harlech" and the of the positive title of the night was the undying sextet from "Lucia," selected as an encore to the Strauss selection.

The choir was in fine form, the ladies' section being especially beautiful, and it rendered the part song "Moon Light" with such fine effect that it had to respond to the applause of the audience and the band by rendering the "Soldiers' Chorus" from "Faust" in ringing style. Equally good was the work of the organ in accompanying the band by Wagner, with the band and the organ accompaniment. This was a great piece of combined work, but artistically speaking it was not all that it should have been, for the reason that the singers were so much over-weighted by the double accompaniment.

Mr. Moritz's clarinet solo was heartily received. Miss Allen, whose big voice does not always have a perfect effect, scored well in her "Romeo and Juliet" song, and an encore responded to with Gorman's grand "Ave Maria" with organ and violin accompaniment. Miss Powers had an immense recall after her violin solo, and gave Schuler's "Serenade" to a harp accompaniment which was one of the gems of the evening.

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Lyrics—This week's bill continues to draw good audiences and give satisfaction to the patrons. It will run up to Friday night.
