24 TRIBUTE TO MOTHERHOOD

An Address by BISHOP HEBER C. IVERSON Before the Liberty Stake Conference, in the Tabernac'e, Salt Lake City, Sunday, July 19, 1908.

#### (Reported by F. W. Otterstrom.)

I have been, unexpectedly, called upon to occupy this important position for a few moments this afternoon; and, therefore, I feel much in need of the assistance which comes from the exercise of the faith and prayers of those who are before me.

'I rejoiced greatly in the spirit of the morning meeting of our confer-I was very deeply impressed with the instructions given, especially while listening to one of our sisters addressing the audience. I wish every mother in Israel, every mother in all the world, and others who are not all the world, and others who are not mothers, but ought to be honored mothers, could hear the testimony we listened to, this morning, from a God-fearing mother. The sentiments ex-pressed were sublime; they were, in-deed, the sentiments of the gospel of Jesus Christ, inspired by the divine Spirit, and I would that every woman in all the world could partake of its sacred influence and receive the sublime instructions that were given this the important part that mothers can

bilme instructions that were given this the important part that mothers can play in this great work, our sister in-cidentially spoke of the great duty of motherbood. I remember reading a tibute paid to motherbood. I re-gard it as a well deserved tribute, and as we look at it and analyze it care-fully, I believe we will be agreed that it is, indeed, a well deserved tribute. Some one has said: "God could not be with us always, to He gave us mothers." Sister Emily Higgs, this morning, ex-tion she could desire to occupy and that any true woman could wish to occupy in the world, is one of homered and homerable motherhood. When we malyze the sentiment expressed in these words and in the words I have just quoted you, I think we must all ounclude they are true. You, un-doutedly, remember reading the words of Paul, the apostle, wherein he said: "We have had fathers of the flesh
