The overflow system. vis cut through a line stone forma-ion, and was 12 feet deep, 28 feet wide and 300 feet long, which was an im-neuse piece of work when the water was rising so fast. It was not com-pleted to the depth desired, but when four feet below the surface of the water in the reservoir, which by this time had risen to the height of 45 feet, it was impossible to hold it any longer, so it was put into use.
