STATUS OF CITY COURT CASES.

Shall Not be Appealable Unless Judgment Rendered Amounts to \$100 or More,

The supreme court has handed down an opinion dismissing the appeal in the case of F. Garcia & Co., appellants, vs. John F. and Susie Free and defining the status of cases originating in the city court and appealed to the district court, and then to the supreme court. The court held that such cases shall not be appealed to the supreme court unless the judgment rendered in the district court shall amount to \$100

this case judgment was rendered in the city court in rayor of plaintin for \$303.50, and defendants appeared to the district court. In that court ludgment was rendered in favor of c tendants by the court, deciding that plainting had no cause of action. The plainting then appealed to the supredacourt. The attorneys for appealints contended that the amount involved in the case was more than \$100, hence it is appealable to the supreme court. Jus-Lee Straup wrote the opinion of the suthe strain which helds that unless the judgment rendered in a case orig-inating in the city court amounts to \$100 or more it is not appealable to the supreme court and orders the appeal in this case dismissed. Another opinion was handed down

by the supreme court yesterday after-noon in which the judgment of the low-er court is affirmed in the case of A. er court is affirmed in the case of A. R. C. Smith, appellant, vs. Gldcon Al-vord. The action was brought in Weber county to recover damages for alleged trespass. It was claimed that Alvord dug a dich along the boundary line between his property and that of plaintiffs and injured the latter's fence and the latter is fence planning and injured the latter's feater and trees. In the lower court it was held that the ditch was on defendant's ground and that plaintiff had no cause of action. This judgment is now af-firmed by the supreme court.

COURT MOTES.

Judge Morse has rendered a decree in favor of plaintiff in the case of Lulu P. Ingersoll against Ida B. Winter quieting plaintiff's title to part of the southeast quarter of section 17, town-ship I south, range I west. The plain-tiff will have to pay defendant \$640 taxes on the property.

FARMERS COMPLAIN

Take Action in District Court Against The Smelters.

The Valley Farmers' association has forced the smelters to take the last resort in its case for permanent restriction of smelting ores in Salt Lake valtion of smelting ores in Sull Lake val-ley. Yesterday the four smelting com-panies appeared before Judge Marshall and petitioned for a hearing before the United States court of appeals. The companies in question are the Ameri-can Smelting & Refining, Utah Consoli-dated, United States and the Bingham Consolidated, all of whom are operat-ing smelters in or near Bingham and Murray. The farmers to the number of Murray. The farmers to the number of 169 who have property near the smel-ters are the plaintiffs in the case. Judge Marshall decided that the smelters shall not treat ores carrying more than 10 per cent sulphide to be emitted into the air. The smelters have as a last resort moved to the court of ap-peals, and each filed bonds for \$100,000 as set by Judge Marshall. The farm-ers will meet within a few days to reorganize for the campaign which has now been brought about, and they are
