Local and Other Matters.

TEMPERATURE.—41 degrees F. in the shade at 1 p.m. today. Fine, a few clouds.

Stormy.—Raining a little this afternoon.

Late.—The Central Pacific train was two and a half hours late today.

Snow.—Last night was blizzard and stormy, and this morning about three inches of rather compact snow lay on the ground.

Released on Bail.—The examination of Louis Ordner, for the killing of Robert Riley, was concluded yesterday afternoon, resulting in the accused being bound in \$3,000 bonds to answer to the grand jury.

Under the Auspices.—Mr. C. W. Stagner's lecture of "American Humor, or Funny Things and Funny People," will be delivered under the auspices of the members and officers of both branches of the Territorial Legislature, at the 14th Ward Assembly Rooms, on Monday night.

The Panorama.—Messrs. Lambourn & Kirkham have returned from their northern trip with their excellent panorama. They visited the settlements in Cache Valley and some points between here and locally, meeting with very good success. They will probably exhibit in some of the Wards in this city, and then leave for a trip through the settlements of the south.

Called Away.—Last evening Chief Justice White announced from the bench that, owing to intelligence he had received by dispatch, he would be under the necessity of visiting, on business, his former home, in Alabama, and that he would leave for there this morning. During the absence of the Chief Justice, Associate Justice P. H. Emerson will occupy the bench of the Third District Court.

Returned Missionary.—We were called upon today by Elder A. W. Sabin, of Grantsville, who returned, this morning, from a mission to the Eastern States. He visited Wisconsin, Maryland, New York and Connecticut, held a number of public meetings, baptized a few, and re-baptized some others who had been formerly connected with the Church. He left this city to go on his mission on the 8th of May, 1875, and has consequently been absent nine months.

An Ingenious Deviser.—On Tuesday night a convict named Hale made his escape from the penitentiary by the aid of a clever device. He had constructed an ingenious contrivance, composed of clothing stuffed with straw, he placed it in his bed, so that when the guard made the customary count before looking up, to ascertain if all the men had been brought in from the yard, the stuffed figure was counted in as Hale, while the latter was hiding outside the building. In the course of the night he managed, with the aid of some tools, which he hid in the straw, to climb the gate. The discovery of the escape was not made until the following morning.

Hale was convicted of cattle stealing in the First District, and sentenced to a term of years.
