

HARRIMAN ON THE EARTHQUAKE

Evidence of Its Destructive Work in San Francisco Everywhere Visible.

NEW CITY TO BE SHAKE-PROOF

State is Very Prosperous, Everybody Looking to Future and Not At Past.

Omaha, May 7.—E. H. Harriman's special train arrived here at 2:45 p. m. on what is expected to be a record-breaking run from the Pacific to the Atlantic coast. The fast running so far, however, has been mostly on the Union Pacific. The train left Oakland at 7:33 o'clock Saturday night and Sparks, Nev., at 6:47 o'clock yesterday morning. Forty-six miles an hour was made between Sparks and Green River, Wyo., and 52.8 miles per hour between the latter point and Omaha. The highest speed was made between North Platte and Grand Island in this state. The 128 miles was covered in 114 minutes. Twelve minutes were consumed in changing engines here, and Mr. Harriman and party pulled out over the Northwestern, expecting to reach Buffalo in time to catch the Empire State Express, which will take them into New York at 10 o'clock tomorrow night, making the run across the continent in 71 hours and 45 minutes.

While here Mr. Harriman made the following statement to a representative of the Associated Press regarding the situation in San Francisco:

"The earthquake was the most severe that has occurred since San Francisco became a great city. This is evidenced by the destruction of churches and other large buildings—showing some faulty construction—the older houses, erected by the pioneers and early citizens having in many cases withstood the shock unharmed, as did the recent modern steel structures.

"When San Francisco is rebuilt no material damage will be feared. Under the new laws all buildings will be reconstructed under requirements which will prevent indiscriminate erection of faulty structures and which will promote the possible artistic or architectural effect by providing that the height of the buildings shall not exceed one and one-half times the width of the street, and also that avenues shall be wider, which will enable not only the beautifying of the city, but will prevent the spread of fires in the future, and make possible a clearer means of communication or transportation.

"California was never more prosperous than this year. The crop outlook is better than for many seasons, and all businesses are on a sound basis; the bankers are strong with resources. Probably, for that reason, San Francisco is better able to stand such a catastrophe than any other city in the country.

"The officers of the quartermaster-general's department of the army, of which Maj. Dwyer is chief, and of the commissary department, and especially the surgeons of the army, have all labored unremittently and effectively in caring for the distributing supplies and organizing hospitals. The debt of San Francisco to the United States army will never be discharged.

"I think that is the sentiment of every citizen. The state militia of California has in some cases been criticized, but, to my mind, its officers and men are entitled to and will receive a full share of the gratitude and respect of the citizens of San Francisco and of the state.

"The saving of the docks and water front enabled the work of rescue and relief to be conducted much more effectively than would have been otherwise possible.

"It is hard to imagine what might have happened had means of communication been restricted to the narrow neck of land south of San Francisco. The saving of this part of the city was mainly due to the co-operation of the naval department, under Admiral Goodrich, with the civil and other forces.

"To speak a worthy word of Mayor Schmitz and his administration of the city's affairs during a time when would try the souls of the bravest and strongest man, would sound like flattery, so fully and effectively has he risen to the occasion, so calmly and unselfishly has he labored with citizens of every grade and political faith to make all the salvage possible out of the wreck and to organize against crime and for the purpose of reconstruction. He has notably proven himself to be the man of the hour.

"As a matter of fact, among all the public men and business men whom I have not found one looking behind him, every man had his eye on the future, his mind alert, and his hand ready to do anything that would speed him to the realization of his vision—a new San Francisco; larger, more beautiful, stronger and more inviting in every way than the one whose ashes now cover nearly 12 square miles.

"There is now in San Francisco sufficient labor of all kinds for present needs. Not until rebuilding is in full progress will more be needed."

BRITISH TRADE RETURNS.

London, May 7.—The April statement of the Board of Trade shows increases of \$18,857,000 in imports and \$14,499,000 in exports.

The returns show the continued buoyancy of British trade. The total of imports and exports was the largest ever had in the month of April. The aggregate increase of exports and imports for the first four months of the year reaches the huge total of more than \$170,000,000.

TALL BUILDINGS FOR SAN FRANCISCO

Earthquake Had Very Little Effect on Those That Were In It.

WIDE STREETS ALSO NEEDED.

Gen. Greely Will Have the Broad Line More Closely Watched.

San Francisco, May 7.—"The new San Francisco should be rebuilt within a year of the beginning of reconstruction," said Arnold W. Brunner, the New York architect, this morning, after he had consulted with the committee of 49, which has in charge preparation of general plans for rebuilding.

"The tall building is the building for San Francisco," continued Mr. Brunner. "The earthquake showed that, but it ought to have wide streets to front on the building plan, adapted to the commercial needs of the city, from the best scheme for the reconstruction of the metropolis. With steel frame buildings it will be earthquake proof, and no general fire will ever get a chance to start."

Architect John Gahn Howard, a member of the committee and noted as supervising architect of the new buildings at the University of California, said:

"The committee is now well organized, and there is an admirable spirit of harmony and earnestness prevalent. I anticipate a speedy completion of a general report. There is no opposition of interest between the new buildings, the practical in the work before us. The convenient and useful are the immediate ends to keep in view. Incidentally these will result in the beautiful."

"And instead of a vast costliness, an actual saving in expense must characterize the most desirable plan. Ornamentation is not to be insisted on, but practical accessibility is one of the most vital practical needs."

None of the sub-committees of the reconstruction committee of 49 was prepared to report at this morning's meeting. W. J. Barnett stated that the board of directors of the Denver & Rio Grande railway had appropriated \$25,000 to be expended at the direction of Virgil Bogue of the Western Pacific railway and himself. Inasmuch as it was certain that the reconstruction committee would have large expenditures of its own to meet in the way of clerical and other employment, it was his pleasure to place this appropriation at the service of the committee. The donation was accepted with a vote of thanks.

The mayor read a telegram from the director of the United States mint to San Francisco, dated May 4, authorizing to give him the city vault space in which to deposit the municipal funds, amounting to about \$500,000.

The final report of the day reported that the amount of relief subscriptions confirmed was \$4,406,248.

Dr. F. B. Eaton of this city, whose family sought shelter at Independence, Cal., estimated today that 1,000 physicians and 700 dentists were rendered absolutely helpless by the great fire, and he believed that many of them were in an actual need. Most of the physicians were out on emergency work the first day, and lost their instruments, library, records and furniture. The most costly and valuable appliances of the dentists were so severely fastened to the walls and floors that they could not be moved before the flames destroyed them.

The heaviest loss, however, lies in the widespread scattering of patients. Thousands of persons who were under medical and dental treatment have gone out in the north of the city, and tens of thousands cannot be traced for months. The United railroads are now operating 200 cars and employing 2,000 men. All of the dentists present will be in operation within a few days.

At today's meeting of the finance committee, Dr. Devine, representing the National Red Cross, and Maj. F. J. Baker, who is in charge of the consolidated relief stations, were authorized to work out a plan by which restaurants under their auspices would be organized in the seven sections into which the city has been divided by the army authorities.

Hot meals at 15 cents each are to be served at these eating places, and the plan is to eventually dispense with the matter of registration for free supplies. These meals will be for worthy persons and the liquor issued to them will be collected by the relief committee out of its funds. The finance committee will hear a report from Dr. Devine and Maj. Baker on the practicability of this plan at its next meeting.

Gen. Greely was one of the principal speakers at the meeting. In the course of his remarks he announced that it was his intention to have the bread line more closely watched than ever. To this end he has just issued an order to have a soldier in charge of asking each person if he or she was absolutely destitute and in no position to buy food. In this way he hoped to be able to discontinue many who have no business in the line.

The following financial statement was presented: Receipts, \$2,355,187.45; disbursements, \$85,527.55; balance, \$2,269,659.90.

Total claims reported to date, 1,619, representing \$50,000. Subscriptions (confirmed), \$14,750. Total, \$4,377,609.90.

BETRAYED HIS FRIEND.

Thos. J. Wainwright Goes to Penitentiary for Seven Years For It.

Minneapolis, May 7.—Thomas J. Wainwright, the alleged guilty last week to the robbery of Dr. G. N. Pinault, who had befriended him, and was captured in New York after a sensational chase, was today taken to the state penitentiary at Stillwater to serve a sentence of seven and one-half years.

Wainwright not only robbed the Pinault residence, of which he had been left in charge, but also Dr. Pinault's safety deposit boxes, the value of the jewelry and securities taken amounting, it is said, to about \$200,000. Much of this was recovered.

EDUCATIONAL QUESTION STIRRING GREAT BRITAIN.

London, May 7.—In the house of commons today Augustine Birrell, president of the board of education, moved the second reading of the education bill. George Wyndham, Conservative, on behalf of the entire association moved the rejection of the bill. Mr. Wyndham said the bill was flagrantly unjust and violated the principles of religious equity.

Sir Henry Fowler, Liberal, said Mr. Wyndham had avoided the true construction and meaning of the bill. The speaker protested against the language

used outside the house of commons against the bill by former Premier Balfour, Mr. Wyndham and others.

T. P. O'Connor, Irish Nationalist, on behalf of the Catholic schools referred to the profound apprehension the measure has caused. Catholics, he said, felt that it would extinguish the Catholic character of their schools.

James Ramsay MacDonald, Liberal and Socialist, in behalf of the Laborites, criticized several provisions of the bill, but said it contained a genuine attempt to bring the education fabric of the schools under popular control, and that it ought to go to the committee stage.

Cincinnati, May 7.—The national convention of the Commercial Telegraphers' Union of America was opened here today with welcoming addresses and responses, and the appointment of committees and other routine business.

Mayor Dempsey gave the principal welcoming speech.

The afternoon and evening were given over to trolley races at the city and other entertainment providing for the delegates, who represent all the principal cities in the country.
