FOREIGN.

Constantinople.—A proposal was made in the Council yesterday to demand the presence, at Constantinople, of Ismael Pacha, to report upon his proceedings in Germany, France and England; but it is said that the representatives of the Great Powers in this city interfered to prevent this step. It is probable, however, that the Viceroy will come here next month and will remain until the opening of the Suez Canal.

Paris.—Gustave Flourens was wounded in a duel, yesterday, with Cassagnac, but to-day he is pronounced out of danger.

A complete government for the Hudson Bay Territory will soon be formed. McDougal will probably be appointed Lieut. Governor; Rose, minister of finance.

Dublin.—The *Freeman*, referring to the statement of Mr. Bruce, Home Secretary, in the Commons concerning the treatment of Fenian prisoners, says it has reason to believe that he has been misled by prison officials into justifying the treatment of Rossa; the facts are known to be the subject of further investigation, which will show that the severities practiced upon him have been concealed.

Paris.—*La France* has a report that the leaders of the Carlist movement have just held a conference in the south of France, and resolve to enter Spain and make another appeal to the people to declare for Don Carlos.

London, 7.—The British Government have refused to grant an *exequatur* to James Haggerty, appointed Consul of the United States at Glasgow, on the ground that he was connected with the Fenian movement.

Florence.—Correspondence in the *Italiane* announces that the English squadron had sailed from the Bay of Naples for Malta, where it will soon be joined by the Atlantic squadron. The assembly of the English naval forces was intended to prevent, in case it was needed, hostilities between Turkey and Egypt.

Havana.—Stringent rules for the collection of customs have been put in force by the Captain-General, and already reports show a remarkable increase in the revenue receipts. Heavy rains are prevailing, and prevent military movements in the interior.

London.—The regatta of the Royal yacht club closed yesterday with a race of schooners and yawls of over thirty tons. The course was round the Isle of Wight. There were eight entries. The schooner *Alce* won, beating the *Cambria* six minutes.

In the House of Commons to-night the Canada loan bill was read a third time and passed.

London.—In the Commons last evening Bruce, Secretary of State for the Home Department, in reply to questions from Sir Roundell Palmer, said the pressure of public business had prevented the introduction of a bill to establish a uniform marriage law for the United Kingdom; but when opportunity presented the question would be dealt with on liberal and unsectarian principles.

Moore, member for Tipperary, inquired as to the course of the government in regard to the Fenians. Mr. Bruce replied that O'Donovan Rossa and other Fenians had been subjected to the punishment which strict discipline and their misconduct required, the treatment, however, was not unnecessarily severe.

Maguire, member from Cork, appealed to the Government to extend clemency to the Fenians.

Viscount Milton made an inquiry respecting the boundaries between the British possessions and the United States. O'way replied that the land question had already been settled; with respect to the water boundaries, Earl Russell in 1860 had proposed that the matter be referred to arbitration. The U. S. Government agreed to this proposal, but the negotiation was interrupted by the breaking out of the war. The last American Government had renewed the proposition for arbitration and a convention had been signed, which now awaits the ratification of the Senate.

Mexican advices say that the Indians in the State of Chiapas, and on the frontier of Guatemala, have revolted, committing serious depredations. At Chantula and several other large towns, they raised the standard of insurrection and murdered the curate and residents. About ten thousand marched on Sacatebatal, but were defeated by the government troops, and were afterwards rein-

forced and continued to threaten the city.

London, 6.—Advices from Auckland to June 1st say that severe shocks of earthquake visited the island on the fifth of May, and continued at intervals for four days afterwards; no lives were lost. War had broken out at the Lamoan islands; one battle was fought between rival factions, in which 78 men were killed. The British Consul's flag had been torn down, but no Europeans were hurt.

New York.—The *Herald's* special, at Madrid, of the 5th, says Mr. Forbes, of Boston, had an interview with Gen. Prim and Marshall Serrano, during which the proposal to purchase Cuba by the United States was brought up. Mr. Forbes was presented to the Regent and Secretary of war by the American Ministry. The proposal has not been accepted up to the present; Mr. Forbes, however, continues his negotiations.

The *Herald's* special at London says the *Senatus Consultum* is rapidly winning favor in France. It concedes three cardinal points: first, the legislature will have the power to elect its own officers and govern itself; secondly, it will have the right to initiate laws. Thirdly, it will have the power to control France. It will thus be seen that the sovereign power is divided between the executive, the legislature and the people. This being the first time in the history of France that constitutional reforms have been accomplished without force or violence.

The *Herald's* special at Madrid says that Prince Henri De Bourbonne a brother-in-law to Isabella is preparing to return to Spain by permission of the Government. The prince was several times banished by the Ex-queen on account of his radical opinions. Admiral Topete is striving hard to obtain the Spanish crown for the Duke of Montpensier. It is stated positively that Spain has refused to sell Cuba to the United States on any terms.

Dublin.—The Irish Bishops, in conference, resolved that a general synod, in which the laity as well as the clergy will be represented, shall assemble at an early day; they have also decided to convene provincial synods to consider the local changes necessary to be made in the Church under the present circumstances.

Vienna.—During the discussion of the war estimates in the Reichsrath, Baron Von Beust said, "it was hazardous to promise to maintain peace for any considerable length of time, but expressed his opinion that if no war occurred during the next four years, the preservation of the peace of Europe for a long period beyond was certain."

Florence.—During the celebration of a great festival at the Cathedral of Troniscile the drapery caught fire; the church was crowded at the time. The congregation was seized with a panic and rushed for the doors in confusion; sixteen persons being trampled to death and a large number badly bruised. The fire was easily extinguished before any considerable damage was done to the Cathedral.

London.—The press comment on the seizure by the American Government of the gunboats building for Spain at different points of the United States. The *Morning Star* says the American Government, having exhibited vigor in favor of Spain by enforcing the neutrality laws, has now proceeded vigorously against Spain for the same cause.

The writer regards the recognition of Cuba by Peru as ill advised, though spirited, as in spite of all predictions the Cuban insurgents seem able to hold their own. It is whispered of the cession of Cuba to the United States, and now, louder than ever, that the Americans have desired to gain possession of that island for the past twenty years, and now, the obstacle of slavery having been solved, if a fair purchase can be effected all parties may be satisfied with the arrangements which will give another State to the Union and remove a cause of great perplexity from the arena of Spanish politics.

The *News* concludes an article on this subject as follows: Considering all the circumstances which make it difficult for Europeans to keep hold of their unwilling colonies in America and reflecting that Cuba is now in a state of insurrection, Spain will be fortunate if \$20,000,000 ever reach Madrid as the price of Cuba.

London.—At an early hour this morning, during the session of Parliament, great excitement was caused by a loud explosion in the building. A search was instituted and a tin case which had contained powder was picked up on the terrace near by; not much damage was done and no arrests were made. The affair is involved in mystery.
