FEES FOR PHYSICIANS.

Will Receive Pay if They Gather Health Statistics.

Seey. Beatty of the state board of health said today, that a bill would be introduced into the legislature, providing expenses or a fee, or both, to be paid to physicians about the state for gathering vital statistics and reporting the same to the state board. Physicians have got tired of paying out of their own pockets for this, because there is no provision by statute for reimbursing them, and their filing for reimbursing them, and their filing objections with the secretary of the state board results in the plan for leg-islative action. Utah is now one of the first states in the Union, in the matter of completeness and efficiency in vital statistics registration, and nearly prepared to be classed as a registration state by the federal census bureau. WOMAN SEVERELY BURNED.

Spark From Stove Set Fire to Her Clothing.

Clara La Void, a young woman residing at the rooming house over the Council saloon, 10 east First Suth, was severely burned about the body and shoulders early yesterday morning, A spark from the stove set her skirt on fire. This she extinguished as she thought, only to find that it had pen-etrated into her under garments. Her cries brought ald, but not before she cries brought aid, but not before she had been badly burned from her knees to her shoulders. She was attended by Dr. C. F. Pinkerton, who advised her to go to the Holy Cross hospital. Considerable mystery surrounded the case yesterday, as the girl would dis-close nothing. The accident came about in a peculiar way.
