## MONUMENT FOR NEWEL KNIGHT.

The special from Niobrara, Nebraska. to a Salt Lake morning paper, which states that Isaac Riddle, of Utah, and his brother J. H. Riddle, of Crete, Nebraska, are at Niobrara trying to lo-cate the burial ground of some of the "Mormon" people who were buried there in 1846, is of some interest to those who lost relatives at that place. In the fall of 1845 the Knight family d other Saints, who were driven from auvoo, located at a point on the Misuri river, where the town of Niobrara w stands. They called the place Lit-Ponko, on account of it being on the lands of the Ponko Indians. There they remained till the spring of 1847, when some of them started for the valleys. Some of the pilgrims died and were burled at Little Ponko, among them Newel Knight, father of Jesse Knight, of this city. The widow was left with seven little children and went to Win-ter Quarters where she remained two years before coming to Utah with the

family. It is the intention of Jesse Knight to erect a suitable monument to mark the resting place of his father (whom he does not remember) and the other Saints who were buried at Little Ponko, if their graves can be located. With that end in view he induced Mr. Riddle to go to Niobrara, Mr. Riddle was one of those who stopped at Little Ponko during the winter of '46-7; he was older than Mr. Knight, and believed he could locate the graves, and he was sent for that purpose. The production of cocoanut butter at the factory in Mannheim, which dates from 1886, has now reached about ten tons per day. This material which is used as a substitute for butter and lard is claimed to contain 99 per cent of vegetable fat with only a trace of water while ordinary butter consists of \$5 per cent of fat and nearly 15 per cent of water. The price in Germany is about half that of butter. The cocoanut butter keeps for three or four months in a cool place and its wholesomeness and discatibility are shifts it % steady and digestibility are giving it a steady gainin favor for cooking and baking espocially for hospitals and army camps. The process by which the fat of the cocoanut kernel is freed from free acids and other substances are mostly secret.

Readings of the wind's force are transinitted electrically to a distance by a new French instrument. The spindb carrying the revolving cups of an ordin ary anemometer also carries a small Gramme ring which revolves in the field of a strong permanent magnet, and connection is made between the coils of the ring and a special form of volt-meter, whose graduations are adjusted to correspond to speeds of the wind as measured by the anemometer.

A "leather-sole fluid" proposed by E. Souther for preventing slipping, con-dists of 50 grammes of thick turpentine, 200 grammes of colophony, 50 grammes of benzine and 200 grammes of alcohol the mixture being allowed to stand in a warm place until the turpentine and colophony have dissolved. The solution is applied several times to the soles. Not only is the slipperiness overcome, but the leather is preserved.

Attempts to combat the codling moth by breeding a certain small fly will probably be made in New Zealand. Dis-covery of the parasite was brought about by the observation that the pro-portion of sound apples increased on plantations where spraying to destroy the codling moth caterpillars had been discontinued. Addled codling moth eggs in great numbers were found, and in some of them were eggs of the parasite.

When arsenic is being regularly taken-either medicinally or accidental-ly in drink or food-it appears that enough is absorbed by the hair to aid in the diagnosis of poisoning. A simple test is to treat the bair with an ammonia copper solution, and then ex-amine it under a microscope-the hairpith containing a small quantity of arsenic being unchanged under a half inch objective but showing small green granules of copper arsenite under a sixth-inch objective. One authority believes that this test will become of importance in criminal trials. The amount of arsenic is often too small to be determined, but in the case of a patient using the posion as a med-icine the hair was found to contain arsenic in the porportion if 0.3 to 10,000, and in a patient who had been using arsenical beer the hair showed as much as 1 part of arsenic in 10,000

One of the most difficult subjects for the photographer has been the aurora borealis. Even the most brilliant displays have made no impression on the sensitive plate, and it was only after many trials that Herr Tromholt, in Norway made the first successful attempt to be recorded, securing a picture after an exposure of 8.5 minutes An account has just been given by Herr-O. Baschin of experiments begun years ago in Lapland. The sensitiveness of the plates was increased by staining with erythrosine, and it was finally made possible to get good pictures in seconds.
