Appropriate speeches were made on the occasion and the following memorial to Congress, received, in a very short space of time, 296 siguatures:

To the Hongrable Senate and House of Representatives of the United States, in Congress Assembled:

We, your memorialists, citizens of Kayaville, Davis County, Utah Territory, respectfully represent that, wherehonorable body by Senator Trunsbull, purporting to come from the citizens of Utah, praying that all that portion of this Territory North of forty-first parallel of North latitude be annexed for government purpose to the Territory of Idaho; whereas it was never made known to us that such petition would knew that the gentleman from Massa be presented, and, whereas the adoption of such a measury would bring us under laws that we have had no part in forming and which are incompatible to our interests as agriculturists, and burden us with a debt we have had no part in contracting, we, your memorialists, do most solemnly protest against such an. rose and the House adjourned. nexation, beli-ving such a measure would be in direct opposition to our interests as citizens and to the development of the resources of the Territory of Utab.

The "Oldest Inhabitant" on the floor of Congress-A set-to between Butler and Cox on the Milenge Question.

Roots introduced a bill to encourage the establishment of a mail steamship line to India and China and to promote emigration from Europe to the Southern States; referred.

A resolution, previously reported from the committee on foreign affairs asking the President for information concerning the imprisonment of American citizens in Eugland, for political offen-ces, came up and was discussed during the morning hour.

On motion of Banks the privilege of the floor for a day was given to John Kitts, a revolutionary soldier, who appeared on the floor and conversed with the members, showing but slight indications of bis extreme age. He was born in Pennsylvania in 1762. He wit-nessed the surrender of Cornwallis and served also in the war of 1812.

A resolution was adopted directing the committee on public lands to define, by law, what was meant by swamp and overflowed land.

The House went into a committee of the whole on the legislative appropriation btil. The amendment offered yesterday, for keeping the Capital police up to the present number and pay, was discussed at some length and rejected. The paragraph for the pay and mileage of members having been reached, Butler, of Mussachusetts, moved to ref it to half a million, with a proviso that no part shall be paid for mileage. He desired the gentlemen to go to the country on the question of economy, and that they should vote on some practical thing. The debate was general, spirited and exciting. Kelly, of Pennsylvania, Farnsworth; and Cox opposed the reduction; Ingersol and Lafin supported it. Cox improved the occasion to attack Butler as the man who, he said ironically, loved the people and would not take the mileage either in currency or gold. Butler re-plied disdainfully "Shoo fly don't bodder me." Cox in turn said everybody chusetts was cousidered a bad man. The discussion was continued by a number of members. Cox again got the floor and made an exceedingly personal apeech in reply to Butler. The vote was finally taken and Butler's amendment was rejected. The committee
