We save you the middleman's profit. thriving little village nextlos under the mountains in the northwest part of Cache Valley, Cache County. It was settled about thirty-six years ago by a few families, and on account of the lack of water and timber (and these conditions exist today) had a very hard time for many years. A few men started to farm the dry benches, and although they were laughed at, and made all manner of sport of, they made a grand success of it. All their grain is now raised on dry farms. The old irrigated lands have been turned into alfalfa or

DRY FARMS.

These dry farms last year produced 230,000 bushels of wheat. This year near 100,000 bushels were harvested. near 100,000 business were narvestee, notwithstanding the summer drouth and heavy frosts. To give an idea of what this people have done in dry farm-ing, it really must be seen to be fully appreciated. Farms range all the way from 80 to 600 acres. The farmers has plowed clear up to the base of th base of the mountains, and every hill and hollow on the benches all around. As a result of their success in dry farming the people are well to do. Of course the miles of wird fencing and the most expensive and improved farm machinery had to be bought, and this kept the people delving to pay off these heavy expenses, but today no ward in Cache valley is more prosperous.

New public and private buildings are being crected and of the modern style of architecture. The old stone school building has been remodeled, and a new brick school house has been built, costing \$2,000. The church has had a new roof, and they are about decorat-ing the inside.

WILL KEEP HIS MEMORY GREEN.
