TONE OF STOCKS WAS SOME BETTER DURING THE EARLY CALL ON MINING EXCHANGE TODAY.

During the Early Call on Mining Exchange Today.

DAILY WEST WAS OFF COLOR

And Sold Lower—Carissa Was the Source of Much Attraction to Operators—The Closing Quotations.

The mining share market was in better tone today than yesterday. Some stocks were quoted lower, but generally speaking the range of prices was better. Carissa opened strong; the first lot offered went at 19 cents; reached 20 1/2 and fell back a few points at the close. Daily West was off color, but it failed to maintain its position and weakened, being offered at 5 1/2 at the close. Daily West also came to the fore slightly in the afternoon, but was in a run of order. The stock began selling at 39 cents and improved several points during the regular call. New York was in prime condition and advanced steadily. Martha Washington was stimulated somewhat by the report that the mine will have a two-car-load shipment of ore on the market in a few days. Uncle Sam was another attractive stock of the day and held firm at about yesterday's prices. Grand Central was in some demand, and higher, while Keystone sold on the open board several points lower. ACTIVE CAMP OF SEARCHLIGHT

District Was Opened Only Four Years Ago.

THE MONTHLY PRODUCTION

Aggregates 8100,000—This the Output of Three Mines—What San Pedro Road Will Do.

Down almost in the extreme southern part of Nevada is a mining district which is comparatively unknown to most Utah mining men. This is the Searchlight district, located near the banks of the Colorado river. The camp is isolated from this part of the world and is most conveniently reached only from Goldfield station on the Santa Fe railway in California. The district was opened up about 4 years ago and comprises a large mineralized territory covering an area of 30 miles in length by 15 miles in width.

To Become Consulting Engineer for the Tonopah Company.

A Brief Summary of the Camp's Marvellous Growth.

A very creditable edition of the Tonopah Bonanza has been issued which tells the story of the marvelous growth of that really wonderful camp, words aided by numerous illustrations.

Nevada's Metal Output.

The metal output of Nevada, covering the year 1902, as reported by the director of the mint, aggregated a total of \$5,334,212.

Liberty District of Nevada.

General Manager W. C. Wynne, who returned last week from the east, states that preparations are being made to work the Liberty mine on an extensive scale. Contracts are to be let immediately for systematic development work to determine the extent of the ore body with the view of erecting reduction works. The day's work on the 200-foot level has been opened up 15 feet in width has been opened up which will average 38 in gold and 100 in silver per ton. In cleaning out the old workings of the Liberty mine a most interesting fact has been developed. The lousers to whom the mine was turned over more than 30 years ago, took out a great deal of ore from the 200-foot level and dumped the waste into the shaft, completely filling it. The old shaft has now been cleaned out to a depth of nearly 500 feet, as far as they could go, and the present bottom of the mine has been reached. Until now machinery is installed it is impossible to determine how much deeper the shaft may be for the remains of the old workings have disappeared—Tonopah Miner.

DEXTER MINE CLOSED.

Managing Director E. O. Lee Issues Order.

Judge Edward O. Lee, managing director of the Dexter mine at Tuscarora, Nevada, came in from that camp last night. The judge has been away as much as two weeks, during which time he explored the underground workings of the mine and made a searching investigation of conditions at the property in general. When seen today he did not care to discuss his findings in detail, preferring to wait until he had prepared his report, which will be presented to shareholders in due time.

It was admitted, however, that the work at the mine has not been carried on as systematically as it should have been for some time past and he concluded the best thing to do was to order a cessation of operations, which he did before starting for home. Some development work will be prosecuted, however, by contract.

The mine is equipped with a 40-stamp outfit but only 10 have been dropping for some time on account of a scarcity of water. The cost to the company was almost as much as it would be if all the stamps were in commission, so Mr. Lee decided it would be a saving of money to hang them all up until such time that better facilities are available.

The property will be closed indefinitely.

ERIE FOUND WEAK MARKET

HEAVY SNOWS ON NEVADA DESERT.

Judge W. A. Sherman Unable to Reach Pactolus.

SUCH WEATHER UNUSUAL

Supplies Will be Sent in Next Week and Work Started at the Big Pactolus Mine.

Judge W. A. Sherman has returned from a trip to western Nevada, where he went for the purpose of starting up work on the property acquired by himself and associates last fall in the new Pactolus district, near Tonopah. The judge stated this morning, however, that he did not accomplish the purpose for which he went to the sagebrush state, on account of the frigid condition of the weather. A heavy fall of snow is an unusual thing in that part of the country; but this winter the desert is covered with it and to a depth which made it extremely difficult to get from the railroad to the mines.

It means new work entirely and all below the 200-foot level, with an expenditure of a large amount of money to get things in shape for that depth, but those who are acquainted with the formation and strength of the vein above the water level, feel certain that the ultimate results will be successful—Pioche Record.

There are about six or eight men now employed at the Douglas group of mines. The snow storm has delayed the work somewhat, but before the end of the month the men will be employed. A station is being cut out to install a small hoisting plant for sinking. A small gasoline engine and hoist are also to be set up—Lyon County (Nev.) Times.

We hear it said that Rev. Mark and Rev. Lellish of Salt Lake City are purchasing for an eastern syndicate some hatching mining propositions on Gold Butte-Beck mine and mill.

The properties are owned by Lyle Kinney, C. H. Matthews and others and some fine looking ore has been taken from them. The claims cover a large section of country which has not been carefully gone over by the prospectors—Salina Sun.
