Big Flood-Terrible Loss of Life Pittsburgh, 27.—A most destructive storm swept over this city last night. The rain poured through the streets from the neighboring hills. The Union depet was inundated with water from three to four feet deep. The Panhandle tunnel was filled with water and rendered impassible. Much property was destroyed on Liberty and Smithfield streets. From all side streets leading from the hill boulders were rolled from their position and hurled to the level below, while in many other places great holes were opened up in the street.
