The attorney general replies that if it was necessary in the prosecution of the parties to have the sheriff retain possession of the horses, it might be proper to charge the county with the expense of keeping them. But if there is no owner for the horses, as is as-sumed in the case, they should be dis-posed of under the law covering the disposition of stolen or embezzled property in the hands of an officer. Any balance that may accrue over the cost of sale would be covered into the county treasury, and if there were a deficit in the case in question, where the property was held for the purpose of trial, it should be borne by the coun-ty, the same as other expenses in criminal cases. #### TO MAKE GOOD ROADS.

#### National Organization is Formed in Chicago.

Chicago, Nov. 15 .- A national campaign against bad roads on a bigger and more comprehensive scale than any if the past is to be organized in Chicago next week. With the formation of a National Good Roads asosciation of a National Good Roads association, with branches in every State in the Union and, if possible, in every county and every township, all the forces which make the clean, level and smooth roadways will be united for unanimous work in every legislative body in the country, from the national congress and the state legislatures down to city coun-cils and county boards of supervisors.
