Action of Mayor Morris on Paving Project Proves to be Economica'.

By advertising for bids for the paving of South Temple street from Seventh to Tenth East streets instead of awarding the contract to P. J. Moran at the figures at which he paved the street from State to Seventh East, the city has saved a large sum of money. This for paving the three blocks were open-ed on Saturday afternoon by the board of public works, and that of the Pal-mer-Tate company, of \$44,756, was found to be the lowest and the con-tract will be awarded to that com-pany. After quite a lengthy discus-sion as to the quality of the material to be used, the board decided to ac-cept the bid on the Utah asphalt. Four bids were received on the different qualities of exphalt to be used, as fol-lows. awarding the contract to P. J. Moran at

\$ 45,477

Utah rock asphalt 44.75 As the Palmer-Tate bid was the low-As the Paimer-Fact bid was the low-est on the Utah asphalt its bid was ac-cepted, and the contract will be sent to the city council tonight for approv-al. The board of public works, hi or-der to save time, several weeks ago recommended that the contract be giv-ent to Moran at his figures for the news recommended that the contract be giv-en to Moran at his figures for the pres-ent work, without advertising it. The council concurred in the recommenda-tion, but Mayor Morris vetoed the oc-tion of the council. Bids were then advertised for, and the result will be a saving of several thousand dollars to the city. The contract with the Pal-mer-Tate company will require the work to be completed by Dec. 31, 1905.
