Public Installation—The George G. Maxwell Post. G. A. R. and Ove Women's Relief corps will hold public installation this evening of officers in the Odd Fellows building. Eighteenth Ward-Prof. Levi E. Young of the University of Utah, will fectore on 'The History of Educa-tion in Utah,' at 6.18 p. m. A special program of music will also be pro-vided, and the public are invited to be present. College Exhibition car will start, on its tour of the state. The car will contain exhibits of the products of the soil, both agricultural and horticultural, gathered from different parts of the state, and the tour to be made will include the towns as far as Rich. will include the towns as far as Rich-mond on the north to Onsis on the Salt Lake Route, Marysville on the Rio Graude and Green River on the D. & R. G. The trip is to be made for educational purposes, to show to the people of the state what is being cone in the way of scientific farming and druit growing within its borders. As a matter of fact there will be two care-one of them devoted to exhibition purposes, and the other being fitted up as a lecture room with steriopticon equipment. In the latter being fitted up as a lecture room with steriopticon equipment. In the latter car, various professors and experts from the Agricultural college will explain the work and methods of cultivation according to accentific principles in vogue at the college and the experiment stations, after they have passed through the exhibit car and have viewed the results of those methods. Tractical stock judging demonstrations will also be given.

EXPERTS IN CHARGE.

EXPERTS IN CHARGE. The car will be in charge of Louis A. Merrill, professor of agronomy at the college. Prof. Merrill, will be assisted by Dr. Ball, director of the experiment station; Prof Northrup, Prof. John T. Caine III, and Mrs. Rena Baker Maycock, who will have charge of the domestic science de-partment of the exhibit. It is plan-ned to have the car open to the public in each town, and where possi-ble public lectures will be given in the various ward halls at 2 o'clock in the afternoon and again at 8 in the afternoon and again at 8 o'clock in the evening. experienced lecturers and scientists will deliver addresses, and only on the most modern and approved methods.
