SCHOOL BOYS' ELECTION.

Teachers, Friday, the election to decide whether school funds shall be loaned by the Board of Education will be held at Independence Hall, 18 W. Third South street, Salt Lake City. The polls will be opened one hour after sunrise and close at sunset. Registered voters will have an opportunity to meet their ballots for or against the loan of the funds. Registered taxpayers who are not registered voters may, in justice, have to vote on the question which affects their property interests. We think they have a right under the law to do so. However that may be, some of them should offer to vote so that the question may be fully tested before a court of competent jurisdiction.

The bonds proposed are to be for the sum of \$100,000, bearing five per cent. interest per annum, redeemable in twenty years. They are not to be issued all at once, but as occasion may require. All that property holders will be taxed to pay the interest and to furnish a sinking fund for the redemption of the bonds, will amount to about one-half of one per cent. on their taxable property, annually. This is estimated on present valuations of property, and on the basis of the immediate loan of all the bonds. But as the property valuation is likely to increase through the growth of the city, and all the bonds will not be issued at once, the tax to pay off the interest and redeem the principal will probably be less than the small amount named.

The money to be raised is to be used for school, rent, buildings, repairs, furniture and other requirements for the improvement of our city school system. This plan is considered the best and wisest that can be devised for the purpose. Prejudice against taxation ought to give way before the needs of educational facilities. It is to be hoped that the voters will go to the polls to-morrow and show their interest in the matter of education for their children by voting "Aye."

The vote should be very much larger than at the last attempt at an election for school bonds, because the question then in doubt was as to the ability of the election has been settled by the Supreme Court, and this election will be conducted under the law as interpreted by the court. THE PEOPLE'S PARTY.

THE action of the Territorial Central Committee of the People's Party, at the meeting held in this city on Wednesday, virtually settles the question of the dissolution of the existing party. The reason set forth in the resolution adopted, why the People's party was no longer active, we believe will commend themselves to the people in every county and that the various committees therein will take immediate steps to act in conformity to the resolution of the territorial committee.

The People's party has done a good work in Utah. It has been the means of disseminating information on political questions. It has educated many newly arrived settlers in the Constitution and genius of our country and provided them with intelligent citizenship. It has caused the question on the reform of civil government in general and the rights of the people in the territories in particular. It has initiated good and economical government, municipal, county and territorial. It has taught the people the value of the suffrage and the importance of the maintenance of the rights of the minority. It has accomplished its mission and it now voluntarily dissolves and retires with honor.

The gentlemen who have stood at the head of the party have served it faithfully, devotedly and without pay. The names of John Sharp, John R. Winter and Franklin S. Richards, who were in succession its Chairmen, have by their skillful and energetic management of its affairs made their names historic. Others in the territorial and county and precinct committees have worked with corresponding vigor and zeal, and are entitled to their most of praise and the recognition and gratitude of the people who have reaped the benefit of their untiring labors.

The People's party has been called the Church party. There may have been some show of excuse for this because it was almost entirely composed of people of one religious faith. But if by the term is meant a party having for its object the domination of one church above another, or the introduction or maintenance of unconstituted authority in the affairs of state, then the claim is untrue and the term is a misnomer.

The People's party never sought to deprive any other party of any rights of religious worship, or of the right of religious freedom. It was composed of men and women of all faiths and political beliefs within the limits of constitutional law. It demanded local self-government compatible with lawful national authority. It recognized the principle of equality before the law and the free exercise of the suffrage by every citizen not considered as criminal by

law. It united various political elements for a common purpose, and that was the good of the whole people and the elevation of Utah into the power and dignity which to which she is entitled.

If the party, which divides citizenship in other parts of the Union had been fairly drawn here, the People's party would long ago have ceased to exist. It contained both Democrats and Republicans of genuine faith and ability. But, while there was a better combined for the purpose of elevating the people of the common rights of citizenship, which permitted no break in the continuance of the People's party was a political necessity, and its various elements had to remain together for mutual protection and to act for political objectives.

But a letter has just been received from Utah and brighter prospects open to the people. Influential men, both Democrats and Republicans, have come out from the faction which threatened the political life of the majority of our citizens and have declared their loyalty to the chief object of that different combination. They are ready to welcome the people of Utah, regardless of religious opinion, into their respective organizations, and they are determined to bury the old animosities and work for better things.

The People's party will now meet them in this spirit. Some of its former members will go one way, some the other, according to their individual preferences. They are not bound to either way, except to go honestly in the way they think to be right.

The result cannot fail to be beneficial if the Democrats and Republicans who have initiated this movement are true to their avowed aims. There will be no dissension on the part of the people. They have never broken a promise nor gone back on an agreement. They will work faithfully for the political redemption of Utah, and may God direct the right!

THE CANADIAN PREMIER.

ALL that is mortal of the famous Canadian statesman, Sir John Macdonald, was today assigned to the cold and silent tomb. For forty years he has been one of the most striking characters of British America and in a certain sense, of the whole North American continent. His political career is essentially the history of Canada, speaking of it as a colony or country. One of his greatest achievements was that of 1867, when the western, independent, and in some cases hostile provinces, were federated into one great commonwealth. To him alone should be attributed the credit of successfully accomplishing the junction of the Atlantic with the Pacific, by the Canadian Pacific railroad.

Sir John Alexander Macdonald was born in 1815, according to some authorities in Glasgow, Scotland, according to others in Canada. He was educated at the Royal Grammar school, Kingston, and admitted to the bar in 1835. During his adolescence and even to his young manhood he inclined to liberal views and was not prone to annexation. His first career as public life was his defense of a freeholder, named DeLoche, who, with a party of men, undertook to revolutionize Canada. The man was hanged, but young Macdonald established a reputation for energy and ability as a pioneer among the foremost at the Canadian bar.

He went to Parliament from Kingston in 1848 as a Conservative. Ever since he has been one of the most active and aggressive gladiators in the political arena of Canada. Whether he can be classed as a statesman in the true acceptance of the term is open to debate. Had he not been a politician in the strictest sense, he was certainly a master. To his fertility of resource, was added a sagacity and shrewdness of mind that made him almost at once a political prophet and general. His ninth office always seemed to be to keep in power, and because of this he was viewed more as a practical politician than as a political philosopher.

Now that he is removed from the arena his actions may be critically analyzed. His federation scheme was something more than party work, and his work is universally attributed to his personal efforts. For the purpose of the nation's government he joined the most heterogeneous race elements, though he did not avoid them or tame them in the ethnological sense.

He put down an insurrection in the Northwest, taught the leader, and yet held him gently with French-Canadian love. He handled the controversy pending in the Jumbo estate with such skill and diplomacy that he had their property returned to them, and yet retained his Orange and Conservative following. When the vicious coalition of the nation's politics was established, a similar coalition would have wrecked any statesman who followed in Britain or in America, but the man who accomplished it, in fact, made this very coalition the basis of his fame and popularity. His "Canadian" policy was a realistic one. "United States might be said to be a misnomer in 1875, when, on the wings, he sailed into office. This policy he has followed ever since, and was the discomfiting loss of annexation and at one time when he found the southward for readiness was not strong enough to put down, he took it up. But he did it in such a way that he placed his opponents in a false position without compromising himself.

His successor will have to be a man as philosophical in politics as was Sir John. A statesman's gift and shrewdness are largely Liberal, yet there is the annexationist of a Conservative. Would Sir Charles Tupper, Sir John Thompson or Sir Robert Borden succeed at the head of a ministry as Sir John did? That is very doubtful. The question on which Macdonald made political capital, was those on which either of the gentlemen mentioned would make a dismal failure.

Sir John was a man of small stature. His height was five feet seven inches, and weight, about 150 pounds. In facial appearance he closely resembled Disraeli, and in his political methods some persons have drawn a resemblance. Canada will find it difficult to fill his place. And indeed a man of resource, originality and ability is found for the post, it will not be all enough calling for Conservatives in Canada.

OFFICIAL POLITY AND BRUTALITY.

He did not think it wise to comply with the law, and as a servant of the law he only duty was to obey."

What a sense of indignation and security this statement of the case must have awakened in the bosoms of the law and order loving people of Canada! How their souls must have seethed within them, in the presence of this official brutality! We would not presume to speak in such a case for the citizens of Canada. The law-abiding class there may have a more exalted idea of official duty than ours. But there are people who are tolerably civilized that would look upon the officer's officers responsible for this action as having about as clear a sense of civilization or the duties of his office as a mutilated giraffe.

As reported, the case as well began in police court. The woman was arrested on the same brutal plan, and the child was kept in the criminal's cage under the gaze of the curious crowd till its mother was notified and secured the required bail for its release. This is altogether a most flagrant example of official stupidity. It is an exhibition of the doctrine of official non-responsibility carried to a monstrous extreme. The idea that a servant of the law has no human discretion in the discharge of his duty is theoretically preposterous, and executed against women and children is partly brutal.

AN IRRIGATION CONGRESS.

IN accordance with a resolution adopted by the Salt Lake Chamber of Commerce on the 4th inst., Governor Thomas has issued a call for an irrigation congress to be held in this city September 15th, 16th and 17th. As irrigation is extended in the several states and territories of the West in rapid strides, we are glad to see that we are not alone in this respect.

We regard the project as one of vast importance just at this period. There has now been sufficient discussion of the irrigation problem of the West for the people concerned and the lawmakers of the nation to have an intelligent conception of its significance. It has been before Congress for several sessions as a leading question and steps have been taken in a half-hearted way to accelerate the duty of the government in the premises. We believe the congress is now the thoroughly ripe for the most important and it carried out to the extent and in the spirit anticipated, it will result in developments of vast magnitude and importance, and in setting finally upon the proper methods to be pursued in the reclamation of the arid lands of the West.

That Salt Lake City is the proper place for the holding of such a congress, will be conceded without argument. The people of Utah were the first in this country to experiment upon irrigation systematically and to any great extent. It was the first to have the reclamation of millions of acres of desert land which without irrigation was utterly worthless to mankind.

Besides being the pioneers in the irrigation experiment, under their system there has been no monopoly of the water, and with the same exceptions. The people are not interested in the water. They have taken out and distributed upon a fair system of irrigation. The fact is that the water is being used in a way that is not only profitable but also beneficial to the people. But the work now to be done in the line of irrigation is upon a more advanced system than any yet attempted. There is very little of the natural flow of the mountain streams that has not been appropriated for the

The question now, therefore, falls upon the methods to be pursued in distributing the waters in the fall season, which is probably the most critical time of the season of irrigation. If the states and territories of the West respond to this call and send competent delegates, the work of the conference might to accomplish a result that could not be arrived at in any other way.
