The light of burning acelylene is very similar to sunlight, and the acety-lene forcing or plants offers interesting possibilities. The pains taking experients at Cornell have given very prac al results. Some plants reached tical results. Some plants reached a good development entirely without sun-light; but in the most important tests one crop was grown under sunlight by day and scetylene at night, and another in sunlight by day and dark-ness at night. The weight of 37 radishes which had been raised in continuous light was 136 grams, while 38 radishes which had had only sun-light weighted only 61 grams, or less than half. Halpin has shown a coal saving of 19 per cent on stationary engines, and is to be stested on a locomotive boller of the Great Northern railway of Eng-land. A storage tank on top of the boll-er is connected to the latter by a pine. er is connected to the latter by a pipe. The feeding water passes through this cylinder, and is heated to the temperature of the bolier by steam taken from the bolier when the engine is standing or the safety valves are blowing.

Mountain sheep are employed as Mountain sheep are employed as beasts of burden in some of the ranges of the Himalayas. The animal carries from 17 to 25 pounds and lives en-tirely on wayside horbage. In a recent expedition of a famous Indian explorer, a flock of them were driven more than 1,000 miles. Miners lond them with borax high in the mountains, and after being driven to the plains they are shorn of wool and return with loads of grain or salt.

Investigating the energy actually utilized by the steam engine. M. Marcehal, a French engineer, has found that 59 per cent of the total heat goes to the condenser in the best system, and 62.6 per cent is dissipated in air by free encantment metres. in air by free escapement motors.

The art of making diamonds has been given a step forward through a study of the diamond-bearing meteoric study of the diamond-bearing meteoric iron of Canon Diablo. In a section of this famous meteoric Prof. Molasan has found numerous diammonds-both black and transparent-together with praphite, and phosphorus and sulphur combined with iron, and he has made experiments to determine the effect of allicon, sulphur and phosphorus. Iron was fused with a large mass of sugar in a crudble in an electric fur-nace. As soon as the molten iron had become saturated with carbon-partly nace. As soon as the moltan iron had become saturated with carbon-parily from the sugar-a small proportion of iron sulphide was introduced, and the crucible was plunged into cold water, with rapid cooling as an essential, the carbon crystallized out from the center of the mass. The iron, sulphide consid-erably increased the yield of diamend crystals, as did also the silicon, but phosphorus had no influence.
