A fund in the meanwhile will be raised to carry on a fight through the courts if it becomes necessary. ESTIMATES RAISED.

C. Iverson told his experience in H. H. C. Iverson told his experience in getting two tax notices from \$1.30 to \$1.75 respectively. He had been notified that the \$1.75 covered land within a "high water area, and the cost of dig-ging was greater." This he said was without foundation in fact, as the sewer trench when due encountered no water

without foundation in fact, as the sewer trench when dug encountered no water, and was not more expensive to dig. Mr. Iverson has learned, he said, that the cost of digging was only 15 cents a foot and the cost of the pipe 35 cents a foot, the total coming to 50 cents a foot, while the people were asked to pay up to \$2.28 a foot, for what purpose he could not tell. That the case was dif-ferent from other districts he showed by stating that on the east bench the people had been taxed for sewer trench 70 cents a front foot, and there the trench was 14 feet deep. He says the government has expended there in the last 18 months on two years \$600,000 in establishing and im proving local irrigation systems. But new proving local irrigation systems. But new settlers are lacking in a proper under-standing of water husbandry, which they must learn before being able to conserve and make an economical use of the water for irrigation. The soft is very soluable in water, so that after water has been running in the ditches for a while the soil is apt to move, and the construction suf-fers. The agricultural prospects are very good, but owing to lack of transporta-tion facilities, the crops can not be mov-ed with that celerity and certainty like-ly to insure profitable shipment. But when the railroads get in there, the country will develope very fast. There is no scarcity of water in that section of the state.
