RIGHT HOOK PUTS "KID" PARKER AWAY

Joe Gans is the Victor After Four Rounds of Fighting.

KNOCK-OUT CAME QUICKLY.

Referee Siler Accused of Counting Too Fast-At First Parker was Nervous and Sparred Cautiously.

Denver, Colo., Nov. 16 .- Joe Gans of Baltimore knocked out "Kid" Parker of Denver in the fourth round of what was to have been a ten-round go before the Colorado Athletic association here tonight. A sharp right hook landd under Parker's left ear finished the battle and was placed so quickly that the spectators could not realize that Parker had been hit. He seemed to have been selzed with an attack of blind staggers, and after being counted out he arose to his feet slowly and grooped his way around the ring until one of his seconds lifted nim in his arms and carried him to his corner. arms and carried him to his cornet. After he had recovered sufficiently to move about unassisted, he inquired of Referee George Siler if he had been counted out and was with difficulty convinced of the truth. Parker's man-ager and chief, second, Billy Edwards, assorted that Siler had counted un-usually fast, and that in reality but six seconds of time had elapsed when Siler declared Parker out and awarded the contest to Gans. The men weighed in this afternoon at 3 o'clock, Parker tipping the beam at 132½ pounds and Gans at 133½. Both men looked in good condition, though Parker ap-peared a little too finely trained. PARKER FLOORED TWICE.

PARKER FLOORED TWICE.

At first Parker appeared nervous and At first Parker appeared hervous and sparred cautiously. Gans tried to draw him out and sent him to the floor twice, once with a stright left to the jaw and again with a left swing to the same place. In the second round Gans whited and Parker tried several country which were possive blocked swings which were neatly blocked. Parker then smashed his right into Parker then smashed his right ship Joe's body several times and got right and left swings to the head. This suc-cess gave him courage, and he rushed Joe, who upper-cut him hard on the jaw as they clinched. There was sharp in-fighting, followed by clinches, Par-ker complaining to the referee that Joe was holding him.

"KID" MAKES JOE WINCE.

Parker started off in the third by swinging hard on Joe's head with his right, and Gans split the "Kid's"car with a vigorous left swing. Joe swung right and left to Parker's head as they worked towards the latter's corner. Joe then upper-cut Parker on the stomach and swung his right to the "Kid's" ear. Parker tried to clinch and received a hard right upper-cut on the jaw. In a mix Gans landed right and left on body, and Parker countered hard over heart, which made Joe wince. Parker put his right hard to Joe's jaw as they broke from a clinch.

LIVELY EXCHANGE OF BLOWS. Joe returned the compliment and both landed hard over each other's heart as the goug sounded. Gans began the fourth with a right over the heart, fol-lowing it up with a left hook to the jaw and a right swing to the head.
