In the Federation Bulletin for January there appears an editorial note describing so admirably and in a few words the real character and work of the women's clubs that we are tempted to quote an extract from it: "It is the testimony of nearly all our advanced testing of nearly all our advanced thinkers, and that, too, in nearly all departments of thought, that the woman's club movement is one of the most hopeful, one of the most progressive and one of the most forcible of all the organized movements of our day. Nowhere is more genuine interest to be found or more hospitality of opinion, and it must be added that nowhere else can more intelligent opinion be found. This is generally explained on the ground that the mon are too busy that the women alone have time to consider advanced questions. Even if this were true, it would furnish no explanation of the woman's club movement. We really have plenty of idle men who could give time to questions either practical or academic if they were so inorganized movements of our day, Notitical or academic if they were so in-clined. The real explanation is found in the fact that the clubwomen of the country include a large proportion of our most earnest and most intelligent citizens. It is a recently include a our most carnest and most intelligent citizens. It is a rare thing to find a trifler among them. As a class they are determined that no sham movement or half-developed academic question shall receive the benefit of their support. They are constantly in alliance and co-operation with all the best of the practical sources of opinion in our day. They cannot afford to make too many experiments. The consensus of opinion from the best and highest sources is always at their command, and they are wise enough to make the few of their opportunities. There are and they are wise enough to make the most of their opportunities. There are few of the really great leaders of public opinion, either men or women, who not now regard the organized power of the woman's club movement as probably the shortest and quickest of all the twentes by which the public conscience may be influenced. This may seem

like saying a good deal, but anyone who knows the inner history of the club movement in recent years will be compelled to accept it in the main."
